OKLAHOMA SPURS

Northeastern Counties to Compete for Line to This City.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 2.—The tentative order of corporation commission relative to retention of so-called "Burlison" rates was re-drafted and agreed upon by members of the commission. The action is held to have been of last Saturday in order that there might be no interruption in the manner of charges.

The report charge on all intra-state business is suspended. The installation charges also goes to the discard and there is a change in the so-called "short-haul rate," involving messages that are within the 12-mile minimum zone. These are raised to 15 cents minimum instead of 5 cents as was the case in the Burlison rates.

The commission took cognizance of the fact that the Southwestern Bell Telephone company has granted increases in pay to employees amounting to a sum said to be in excess of a million dollars a year. In view of this fact it was believed just that the government rates, which include increases approximating 45 to 40 per cent should stand until a final disposition of the hearing, which has been in progress intermittently before the commission since November 5.

More than 1,600 formal complaints of inadequate and inefficient service were made to the commission prior to the beginning of the general hearing early last month. The attorney prosecuting the complaints on behalf of the public advanced the theory, said to have been upheld by all utility commissions, that the service of a public utility corporation can be charged for at no rate in excess of what the service is worth. He proposed that the government rate, which would have au-

tomatically been suspended, except by the order of the commission, at midnight, November 30, be allowed to lapse and that a 12 per cent increase awarded by the commission prior to government control also be suspended.

Counsel for the telephone company, during the general hearing, made application to the commission that the Burlison rates as well as those authorized by the state commission, be permitted to stand pending a decision of all matters in controversy at the conclusion of the general hearing. The general hearing, which involves rates as well as adequate service, has been adjourned until December 17.

MANY TO WORK MINES

Under of Services Made to Operate Oklahoma Properties—Wants Guards Unincumbered.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 2.—Tenders of men reaching as high as 81 per cent of the enlisted strength of the units are coming in from a national guard organization of the state who have been requested to volunteer for service in the coal strike region. Detachments of men have gone to McAlester and work on the prison farm mines was begun yesterday.

Brig. Gen. Charles F. Barrett, adjutant general, said that it is the intent of the department in seeking volunteers for service in the strike region to secure men who can go into the work without detriment to themselves or their families. The guardsmen who will not suffer by absence from position or family will be permitted to tender his services, but unless there is a general mobilization no others will be called.

The work of securing volunteer workers is being prosecuted with dispatch. The workers are to be organized in units of 10 each. Yesterday a notification came from Harmon county tendering four units ready to travel to the strike zone, and also information that two or more additional units will be recruited at once.

Volunteer workers who come via Oklahoma City will find it necessary to remain one night or more in the capital city and provisions are being made to care for these men.
