Of Sheriff Carter Gets President's Boquet

Deputy Sheriff Frank Carter of Lawton, who was in Guthrie recently for requisition papers for O. Chase, is the proud father of twenty-three children by the same wife, and after only eighteen years of marriage. There are seven pairs of twins out of the twenty-three. This remarkable record so pleased President Roosevelt that he wrote a personal letter to Mr. Carter, complimenting him and wishing him success in the raising of so large a family. This family consists of fifteen boys and eight girls and all are in perfect health. Mr. Carter never lost a child.

One time seventeen of the children were sick with the measles and, in order to keep them supplied with drinking water during the height of the fever, without inconvenience to either himself or his wife, Mr. Carter hit on a novel plan. He placed a large keg upon a bureau; to this attached a rubber hose with a faucet at one end. When one of the children wanted a drink, the others would pass the hose to him and he would help himself without disturbing the parents, who that way could enjoy a good night's rest.

The only time when Mr. Carter found that his children were a care was one winter when the whole family was down with whooping cough at once. They had a very trying time, for when half a dozen children are coughing and whooping at once, sleep became almost impossible. This lasted for four months and was the only disagreeable time Mr. Carter experienced in the care of his family. He claims that it is just as easy to raise twenty-three children as only two or three.

Mr. Carter resides in a five room house, and therefore had to make special sleeping arrangements. The boys have one room in which is an immense bed. They sleep on the crosswise of the bed, the fifteen boys sleeping together, the same arrangements being made in another room for the girls.

The meals are taken together and, though the whole family cannot sit down at the same table, they sit or stand around while eating, all in the same room.

Mrs. Carter, who was Miss Lizzie Shaw, is only 32 years of age, while her husband is 41, both being born and raised in La Grange, Texas, removing to Oklahoma in October, 1891, at the opening of the territory, and residing in Lawton ever since. Both are in perfect health.
