MISTAKEN IDENTITY IS CAUSE OF SHOOTING AT LAWTON

Lawton, Okla., Jan. 5.—Mistaken identity is assigned as the cause of a killing yesterday morning in the Rock Island freight yards, when R. S. Taylor, Rock Island guard, was almost instantly killed. A. L. Morris, city night policeman, was shot through the head, and Vic Spurlin, deputy sheriff, received a slight wound in the shoulder. Harry Willingham, deputy sheriff, was not hurt. Willingham, Morris and Spurlin had gone to the Rock Island station, after looking through some of the vacant buildings in search of gamblers and liquor, and were walking south from the station when a flash-light was seen and a gun was fired. The bullet hitting Morris in the head. The officers drew their guns and fired and Taylor was killed. The coroner is requested held that Taylor came to his death by gunshot wound, the shot being fired by H. H. Willingham. The coroner exonerated Willingham from any crime or wrongdoing in the case.

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HIGHWAY MEETING CALLED AT SULPHUR FOR JAN. 11

Denton, Texas, Jan. 5.—C. O. Johnson, president of the Oklahoma, Texas and Gulf Highway association, has issued a call for an annual meeting of this association to be held in Sulphur, Okla., Friday, Jan. 11. Mr. Johnson has urged every county through which the highway passes to send large delegations. Besides outlining work for this year, the organization will elect new officers to have charge of the association during the ensuing year. The highway extends from Wichita and Florence, Kan., through Oklahoma and Texas to Dallas. The association was formed in Denton in 1914.

NORWAY LOSES TWENTY-TWO SHIPS DURING DECEMBER.

London, Jan. 5.—In December twenty-two Norwegian ships, with total gross tonnage of 122,222 tons, were lost in consequence of war measures, the Norwegian legation announced. Seventy-five lives were lost.

TULSA COUNTY PLANS BIG ROAD BUILDING PROJECT

Tulsa, Okla., Jan. 5.—Unless some unforeseen obstacles prevent, Tulsa county within the next sixty days will begin operations on a great road surface road building campaign for which the voters have authorized the expenditure of \$1,750,000. Tulsa county will build 109 miles of road and Washington county, on the north, plans to build a complete system of permanent highways, and likewise Creek and Okmulgee counties on the south. When these four counties have completed their plans the belt of the Tulsa district can boast of all good highways as any other similar area in the United States.

KAISER'S MAN FRIDAY DENIES AUSTRIANS MORE CONCILIATORY

Amsterdam, Jan. 5.—The socialist newspaper Vorwaerts of Berlin says that Dr. Eduard David, the socialist leader, told the reichstag main committee that the Austrians were more conciliatory than the Germans at the peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk. The German under secretary for foreign affairs, Baron Von Dembowski-Heldern, denied this. He said no difference of any sort existed between the German and Austrian delegates.
