There will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder at different railroad points in the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations in eastern Oklahoma, from November 18, 1914, to December 9, 1914, the surface of approximately 375,000 acres of Indian segregated coal and asphalt lands, at not less than certain minimum prices. One person can purchase not exceeding 100 acres of agricultural or 500 acres of grazing lands. Bids may be submitted in person or by mail or by authorized agents. Residence on land not required. Terms \$5 per cent cash, 25 per cent within one year and the balance within two years, with 5 per cent interest from date of sale. Where houses or other improvements are located on the lands the same will be sold with the land, at appraised value. Improvements to be paid for in full at time of sale. The coal and asphalt underlying these lands will not be sold with the surface, except where indicated. Where the coal and asphalt are to be sold with the surface descriptive circulars will be sent.
