"A GUIDE TO BETTER SCHOOLS"

A bulletin just issued by State Superintendent Wilson under the above title is all that its name implies and it should be an important factor in promoting the educational progress of the state.

The titles of the chapters will give the reader a general idea of the topics treated. They are as follows: 1. Physical Features. 2. Health and Sanitation. 3. Model Schools. 4. Teachers Home. 5. Consolidation. 6. Union Graded Schools. 7. Rural Schools. 8. Social Centers. 9. Seed Tests. 10. Flower. 11. Moonlight Schools. 12. Thrift Teaching. 13. The School Library. 14. Summary and Conclusions.

Mr. Wilson says, "An attempt is made in this book to point the way, to tell what other teachers have done and to suggest things that should be done and that can be done by any enterprising county superintendent, teacher, school board or community. The book contains many practical suggestions based upon actual experiences of teachers in the schools of Oklahoma."

On the subject of architecture for the rural schools, the book is particularly luminous, being profusely illustrated, and it should prove invaluable to school boards. Equally interesting and practical is the treatment of other topics. The bulletin contains 156 pages, every one of which is full of matter of vital import to schools and school workers.

I wish to extend to the citizenship of Grady county my sincere thanks for their loyalty towards me in the August primary at which time you nominated me sheriff of Grady county.

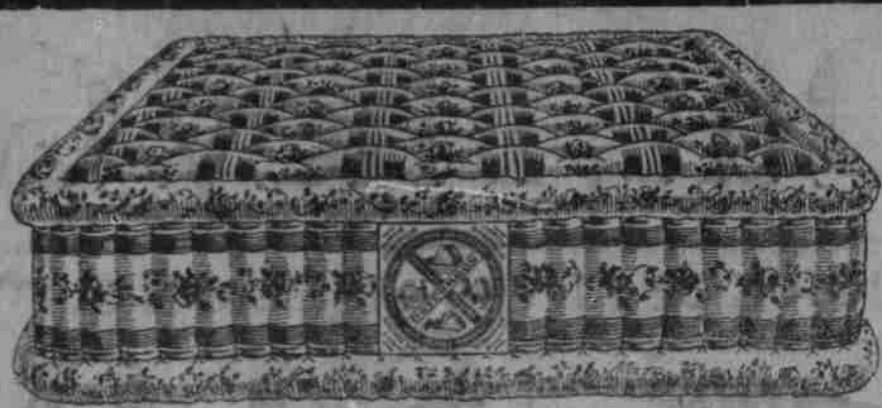
