St. Louis Park Expert Tells City Club of Their Importance

MAKING LOCAL SURVEY

Visitor Says That Tulsa Is Most American City She Has Seen

No one would attempt to suppress the steam that escapes from a locomotive, then why try to suppress the pent-up energy in red-blooded American boys instead of providing a place for this 'steam' to escape naturally?

The lay-out was attended by scores of city club members and by scores of business and professional women interested in civic welfare.

If boys and girls are provided with these playgrounds and allowed to play under the supervision of trained athletic courts of this country will be put out of business, Miss Wolfe declared.

Recreation Cheats Vice. Girl gangs and women gangs need recreation, and unless it is provided they naturally drift toward vice and become frequenters of public dance halls or low cafes.

Take care of the leisure hours and the working hours will take care of themselves, Miss Wolfe stated, and explained that the great percentage of crimes are committed between the hours of 6 o'clock and 11 o'clock p. m.

The present recreational change in St. Louis was started through a desire to provide playgrounds for children, she said, and one of the women's clubs played an important part in the undertaking.

St. Louis was formerly in the hands of a 'big cinch,' according to Miss Wolfe. It was under control of a few moneyed men. The speaking came in 1918, when city affairs passed into the hands of younger men.

Nothing is more conducive to Americanization than gatherings in these parks, attended by Italians, Greeks and others who either participate in or are interested spectators to American games, and converse with playground supervisors who are interested in their welfare and who advise them if advice is necessary.

Industries and big stores in St. Louis help in amateur athletics by loaning or donating athletic suits. The municipal theater has put St. Louis 'on the map' nationally, Miss Wolfe stated.

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 17.—Doctor Burnett Eskridge has been named president of the Oklahoma A. & M. college, to succeed J. W. Cantwell, whose resignation was announced two weeks ago, according to an announcement here late today by the state board of agriculture, the governing body of the college.

Doctor Eskridge has been president of the Southwestern state normal school at Weatherford for the past six years. He is expected to take charge of the college at the end of the school year this June.

Doctor Eskridge began teaching as a master of arts and doctor of philosophy in the University of Chicago, and taught in Tennessee and Texas before he came to Oklahoma. In his first two years of teaching in Oklahoma, Doctor Eskridge was president of the Oklahoma college for women.

Despite elaborate plans to keep the second matrimonial venture of the aged labor leader—he is 71 years old—from public notice, they became known in the last minute and the press hovered in the lobby of the Hotel Woodward yesterday when Judge Robert Wagner, (and time itself) performed the ceremony.

Mr. Gompers' first wife, who was Miss Sophia Julian and who, like the labor chief himself, was a native of London, England, died last May. They had been married 22 years. Gompers having married her when she was only 16. She bore him six children.

Gompers met his second wife some years ago at Trenton, N. J., after he had delivered a lecture. They renewed their acquaintance shortly after his wife's death.

The new Mrs. Gompers was divorced from her husband only last Wednesday, though they had lived separately for some time.
