

INDIAN PAGEANT AT Y. W. OUTING

100 Conference Delegates Mimic Redskins Tonight at Parthenia Park.

TULSA GIRLS LEADING

Public Invited to Witness Production by Pretty Campers in Costumes.

"The pageant of the thing" at the Y. W. C. A. conference camp tonight and the Tulsa public is cordially invited to view the presentation which will be staged by over 100 girls and leaders at 7:30 o'clock on the shores of Parthenia lake.

War, work, and worship in the past, present and future will be the pageant theme, which will be described in the prologue and pantomimed in three acts. Scenes in the first act will be: the announcement by tribal signal fires of the capture of a white girl by Indian warriors and the smoking of a pipe of peace; an Indian village with pottery making, bead designing, corn grinding, and basket weaving in progress; an Indian legend; the evolution of language.

In the second act, the problems of the present will be personified as ignorance, prejudice, blindness, indifference and the third act will represent these problems as solved through work, represented in such vocations as that of the teacher, preacher, student, mother, nurse, recreation work and others.

A professional, which will close the pageant will be led by Miss Patricia Wooden, Tulsa high school girl taking the part of the future, who will bear aloft a flaming torch and who will be followed by the other participants carrying the Japanese lanterns which will be used to light the lakeside. Those witnessing the pageant will be invited to join the procession to the camp grounds which will be open for inspection.

A number of Tulsa high school girls will have leading parts in the production, which is under the general direction of Miss Velela Hoebel, local recreation secretary, assisted by conference leaders. A dress rehearsal was held after supper yesterday evening.

Most of the costumes to be worn have been made by the girls themselves out of cheesecloth, cambric, and gunny sack. Miss Hoebel spent yesterday in Tulsa hunting for such diversified stage properties as 1,000 gunny sacks and 25 bright

100 Tulsa Lads Go on First Y. M. Summer Outing at Tablequah to Get Next to Nature.

With "three rals and a tiger" 100 Tulsa boys early yesterday morning boarded a Midland Valley special train bound for Tablequah and the first summer camp for boys conducted by the Y. M. C. A. This is an unusually large number to go on the first camp, according to Fred E. Woodson, camp director.

The boys brought their baggage which consisted of bedding and a change of clothes, together with a few of "mother's cats" and to the Y lobby Tuesday and early Wednesday morning the room had the appearance of a baggage room. Earl Scott, the camp cook, has been at the camp for several days getting his notes and plans in order and had a big feed awaiting the boys upon their arrival at camp last night.

The camp grounds have been improved since last summer, according to Woodson. A new springboard has been installed in the "ole swimming hole" and the camp itself has been enlarged.

The camp will last ten days. Get time next to nature is the main purpose of the camp, Woodson explained. The entire camp time will be spent in nature study and teaching the boys how to take care of themselves in the open. Visitors day will be next Sunday and all who wish to come are invited to the camp.

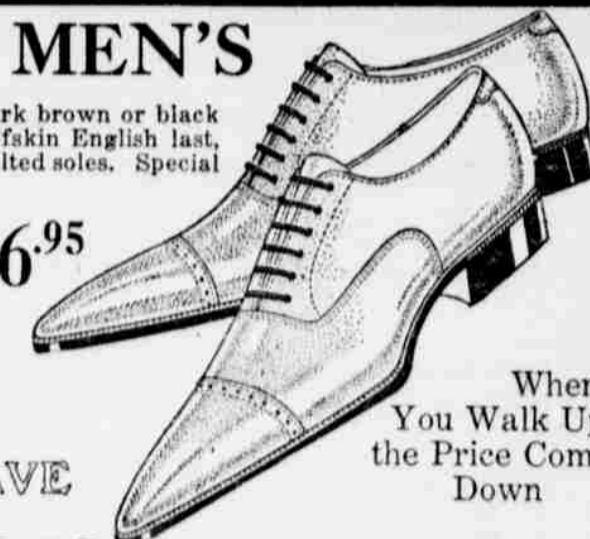

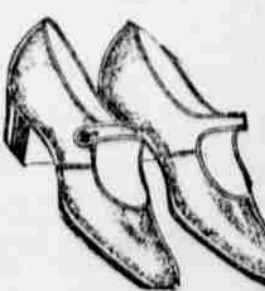
