OBSERVE DRAKE DAY OCTOBER 4

Date Is Changed at the Request of the Chamber of Commerce.

Drake day, an event of international importance to oil men, will be observed in Tulsa on October 4, instead of August 27, as had been planned originally. Edwin C. Bell of Truevite, Pa., secretary of the Drake Day association, informed the chamber of commerce in a letter received yesterday that the date had been changed to conform to suggestions made by the chamber of commerce and prominent oil men. Colonel Drake finished the first

petroleum well on August 27, 1859. Observance of this date has been an annual event for the past few years. Oil men are expected from all parts of the world where there is oil development or potential development.
