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MOTHER ANXIOUS FOR MISSING SON

Jack Markovitz Has Been Missing From Home for Three Weeks.

Perhaps Jack Markovitz is not aware of the fact that his mother is grieving herself to death because of his negligence in not notifying her of his whereabouts. Jack must be thoughtless indeed when he has a mother who has been so good to him. Jack, who is 29 years old, left home three weeks ago while Mrs. Markovitz was in Colorado Springs seeking to regain her health. She had been there only two weeks when a message from her husband notified that the boy was missing and she returned home at once. They live at 361 West Fifth street, where they operate a small grocery business.

"He was always the best boy in the world," Mrs. Markovitz told the World yesterday. "He was so good to me, too. When he left he told his father that he would be gone for two days. He had grown tired of working in the store and wanted to improve his small savings in oil field work. He wasn't at all strong and I am worried to death for fear something terrible has happened to him."

The missing lad is about five feet and eight inches in height, has dark eyes and hair and weighs 140 pounds. If he will but communicate with his parents all will be forgiven in the happiness that his message will bring to afflicted people.
