

# Polish Fall Not Red Aim; Seek Only an Organization

### Want Workmen's Armies For Peace Bulwark; Landlord Doomed.

## WIRELESS INTERVIEW

### M. Tchitcherin, Foreign Minister at Moscow, Relates Attitude of Soviet.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—Russia does not intend to crush Poland, but she does plan to create a great army of Polish workmen, "as a counter pole to the Polish imperialist landlords and as a bulwark of peace," it was declared today by General Tchitcherin, foreign minister in the Russian government at Moscow, and noted as the diplomatic brains of the soviet.

The latest wireless interview of the soviet foreign minister was given to a group of twelve newspaper correspondents. He stated that the soviet government is offering to Poland an interview by wireless.

M. Tchitcherin declared the soviet will claim absolute freedom of action in the orient until a general peace treaty is concluded with Great Britain.

The soviet foreign minister gave the first official denial of reports that the red army is out of hand and that the generals on the Polish front are defying the orders of the civilian members of the soviet. He gave a detailed account of how the military campaign against Poland is being waged.

In reply to numerous questions sent from Berlin to Moscow by wireless M. Tchitcherin gave the following long reply:

"Soviet Russia has not the least intention of annihilating Poland. Russia desires only guarantees against new attack by the Polish army."

**Want Army Cut.**  
"We demand the reduction of the Polish army to 50,000 men, but at the same time Poland's own workmen will be organized and the members of the trade unions will be armed to insure tranquility. This body of militia, composed of armed Polish workmen, will act as a counter pole to the imperialist Polish landlords."

"Thus the soviet government seeks the best guarantee in arming the Polish workers and trusting them to establish the bulwark of peace."

"This is quite a new idea in international affairs. We have studied the question thoroughly and we believe the Polish people are deserving of the greatest attention."

"Russia stands ready to withdraw her army from Poland and the Polish frontier where only 200,000 will be left."

"Instead of Russian occupation, the soviet government relies entirely upon the arming of Polish workers and allow them to maintain peace. Poland will retain sufficient arms and war materials to supply this army of workers."

**Land For Widows.**  
"Russia will insist that Poland grant free land to the families of Polish citizens, who were killed or wounded in the war or had any connection with the war."

"These are the principal points from which you will see the new era beginning."

"One of the questions wireless to Moscow referred to reports that the soviet could not stop the advance of the Russian army on Warsaw even if it desired. M. Tchitcherin thus answered the query:

"Your supposition about the Russian general's superstitious belief in the truly absurd. Neither General Brusiloff nor General Kuropatkin controls the Russian army. They merely sit upon a military advisory board."

"The commander in chief of the soviet army is General Kameneff. His chief of staff is General Lethetoff. The commander on the western Polish front is General Jolohenski, a very good young communist officer."

"The supreme military control is in the hands of a revolutionary military committee at the front. The red army is completely in the service of the soviet government and is controlled by the soviet government."

As to Great Britain M. Tchitcherin said:

"Until a general agreement is reached with Great Britain, the soviet government has an absolutely free hand in the orient. Limitations can be decided upon only by a treaty or some other such agreement. I can give assurances that such limitations will be rigidly observed."

habitually for 200 years, in taking Warsaw from the east, and that all precautions in these actions have been taken.

It is estimated it will require several days before the reds from the northwest reach the city. Meanwhile the newspapers continue confident that a counter attack will bring the results desired to free Warsaw from immediate danger. The reds, however, are making a little progress daily at various points, particularly directly in front of the city and through the cavalry thrust on the northwest.

WARSAW, Aug. 14.—Prince Eugene Sapieha, Polish foreign minister, last night sent a wireless message to M. Tchitcherin, bolshevik foreign minister, announcing the Polish peace delegation's intention to cross the front Saturday at the first and place which had been arranged. M. Tchitcherin sent a wireless message this morning as follows:

"Your delegation will be met at the time and place indicated. Every facility for communicating by wireless and courier will be granted."

Asked whether peace would be declared with Poland, General Winger said: "Certainly it will." He added that the soviet government, which he said had been formed at Stucka, July 26, would proceed to Warsaw upon the roofs of the highest buildings watched the gun flashes until the early hours.

Today's communique concedes that the Poles withdrew further in the center of the Warsaw front, asserting it was for the purpose of regrouping soldiers who have fallen back upon the defense line less than 19 kilometers out.

But more serious than the approach in that direction, according to observers, is the situation northwest of Warsaw, here some 2,000 red cavalymen are making rapid progress toward Vistula. The cavalry's right flank, which follows the right wing of the Russian frontier, has been reinforced by red infantry soldiers, who have requisitioned the peasants' horses and are following closely upon the heels of the cavalry divisions.

The Poles say there is no chance for the bolsheviks to cross the Vistula either below or above Warsaw, as the Russians have been doing.

# SCOUTS THEORY OF ANOTHER WAR

### David R. Francis, Former Ambassador to Russia, Looks for Peace.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—There will be no world war against soviet Russia, France, England, Italy and the United States will not take up arms against the Russians unless forced to do so in self-defense, and they will not be forced, instead, the Russian people themselves will solve their own problems, probably within the next six months, by the overthrow of the bolsheviks.

This prediction was made by Ambassador to Russia David R. Francis, in an interview given the International News Service today following a long conference with Secretary to the President Tully at the White House, and Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby.

Ambassador Francis left Russia in March, 1918, but technically he is still accredited to that country.

"Not more than 15 per cent of the people of Russia are bolsheviks at heart," the ambassador stated. "That being the case, bolshevik rule over Russia cannot last long. The American note on the Polish situation will help a lot. It will find its way into Russia, you may be assured, through General Baron Wrangel, in the control of a southern part of the country and other parts of Europe and in other ways."

"I do not foresee a general war between the allies and the bolsheviks." Diplomats here are apparently of the same opinion.

As a division commander and afterwards in command of the cavalry corps, he continued with the army until the disorders of the revolution had destroyed its discipline completely.

General Wrangel then retired to the Crimea. Arrested by the bolsheviks he very narrowly escaped execution, his life being saved only through the heroic devotion of his wife, who followed him to prison and after persistent appeals finally obtained his release.

In the summer of 1918, with the growth of the volunteer anti-bolshevik army, he was given command of a brigade under General Erdell. Succeeding to command as a result of the illness of his chief, Wrangel with other volunteer forces, succeeded in liberating the Kuban, later entered Stravropol and finally attained, in February, 1919, the liberation of the whole of the north Caucasus and the Terek state, capturing 40,000 prisoners and an enormous quantity of material. He was then promoted to the rank of lieutenant general and placed in command of the Caucasian army.

Stricken with typhoid fever, it was not until April when the volunteer army had suffered heavy reverses that he was able to resume command, and on account of the neces-
