MR. COX'S DIFFICULT ROLE

We have ceased to feel censorious towards Mr. Cox. It is possible to sympathize with him, for truth to tell he is filling, or attempting to fill, a most difficult role.

The popular verdict was made up and ready to deliver before the two conventions were held in June. The task fell to Mr. Cox to reopen the case and change that verdict.

Yet he had Wilsonism on his hands whether he took it on his back or not. The administration had seen to that in the platform it gave him.

It is easy to assert that the democratic nominee has accomplished nothing by the tactics he chose. What could he have accomplished by different tactics? The attorney for a client notoriously without character inevitably seeks to assail the character of the plaintiff.

Unfortunately for Mr. Cox he has very largely forfeited the good opinion of the country. He is suspected. We mean by that this his honesty and sincerity, more than his ability, are under suspicion.

Mr. Cox was the carefully-nurtured candidate of the liquor interests. Up to the point of nomination there was no concealment of the fact. It was rather advertised. But after the nomination a smoke screen was thrown out.

Yet the facts are a matter of easily ascertained record. Mr. George T. Carroll, president of the liquor interests, writing members of his association under date of July 22, says among other things:

The nomination of Governor Cox of Ohio for the presidency by the democrats is a big victory for our interests and it can be attributed to great degree to the activity of our trade organization here in New Jersey and throughout the nation.

In a second letter Mr. Carroll urges campaign contributions so that we may know at once just what our resources are.

In view of this unquestioned record, and in view of the fact that the liquor interests gave permission to Mr. Cox to campaign "dry" in dry territory without offending them, isn't the democratic candidate's role one to excite pity? We think it is. Not many genuine men would have undertaken it under any conditions.
