IN CREEK COUNTY

Republicans Elect Harding by a Majority of 2,500

SAPULPA, Nov. 4.—The last of the election returns were in today by 7 o'clock this morning and conclusively proved without a doubt that Creek county had gone republican. Late last night it was thought that the county judge, county attorney and sheriff's office had been won by the democrat nominees, but when the remainder of the precincts came in this morning it proved that even the office of sheriff had been won by the republicans, although with a very close majority.

County clerk and county commissioner were the only offices won by democrats, these were both won by a small majority.

The county judgeship race ended in Fred Speakman, democrat, receiving 6,661 votes and H. S. Williams, republican, 6,773 votes. This race proved to be a very close one and the last of the precincts had been counted. For county attorney, John N. Hill, republican, won 6,537 votes and George Jennings, democrat, received 6,464 votes. Late last night the democrats claimed this office as theirs.

The sheriff's race proved to be a very close one and the republican, D. B. Livingston, received 6,927 votes and Abner Bruce, democrat, received 6,552 votes.

The county superintendent's office was won with the biggest majority of votes as Mrs. Hallie Peters received 7,920 votes, while her opponent, Helen Fitch, only got 5,390 votes, making Mrs. Peters win with a majority of 2,530 votes. This race went for the republican nominee from the very start.

William Jenkins, republican, was victorious in the court clerk's race as he received 7,093 against the democrat, Maude Elliott's 6,369 votes. The democrats won the county clerk's office by 199 votes, as Mrs. Christina Maddox, democrat, received 6,755 votes and Bertha H. Baker got 6,556 votes.

In the race for county commissioner Vance Likely, democrat, was winner with 3,286 votes and J. W. Thompson received 2,432 votes. For county surveyor, Jos. G. Gillette, republican, received 7,069 votes and Bruce Patrick got 5,874 votes.

For county treasurer Ed Payne republican, received 7,229 votes, while the democrat, E. E. Payne, received 5,321 votes. Frank Lynn, republican, won for county assessor with 7,025 votes and his opponent, John P. Ornell, received 6,984 votes.

Republicans Carry Nationally.
Not only in the county election did Creek county go republican, but nationally, and all other ways, for in the final totals Harding led the ticket with 7,923 votes, while Cox only polled 5,401 in entire county. Congressman Harrell led the ticket with 7,166 votes, his democratic opponent, Scott Ferris, received 5,393 votes. John H. Miller of this city, republican, received 7,768 votes, while Judge Bozarth of Okmulgee received 5,492 votes. For congress, Tom D. McKewen of Ada only got 5,654 votes, while the republican, Fringer, received 7,596 votes.

Republicans Will Celebrate.
The republicans are planning to ride high here on Saturday night, when they stage their ratification program, according to party leaders today. Republican leaders were jubilant today because Creek county had joined the rest and gone republican.

Car Is Stolen.
R. E. Kelso of the Kelso filling station on Dewey street, reported to the police this morning that his Dodge touring car was stolen last night. The car was parked in front of the filling station and was missed about 9 o'clock last night. The car was painted yellow, so he thinks it will be easy to identify it.
