

OLD MAN SHOTS HOUSEKEEPER

Says She, With Help of Man, Was Trying to Get His Property.

YPSICHA, Ill., June 3.—George Kelly, 72 years old, church janitor, today shot and killed his housekeeper, Eleanor Laut, 34, and severely wounded William Hudson, 35. The aged man confessed the murder, declaring he was sorry he had not killed Hudson. He told police the housekeeper had been trying to force him out of his property and that, aided by Hudson, she had threatened his life. The aged man recently made out a will naming Miss Laut, he told police, and had demanded her to leave his property at once. Hath Hudson was made a new will benefiting a daughter. He claimed the deal against his life followed. He told police the housekeeper's room was made dead instantly, but Hudson was not injured.

PREDICTS MORE SUNSHINE

Scientists Say Recent Solar Eruptions Are Good Indications. LANSING, June 3.—Recent solar eruptions which caused brilliant auroras and disorganized cable and wireless service throughout the world may result in the earth receiving more sunshine during the year says Sir Oliver Lodge, the noted scientist. Sir Oliver even ventures the notion that the electrified particles thrown off by the sun during the disturbance may assist in the development of vegetation and reduce the amount of dust held suspended in the atmosphere. Sir Oliver says the magnetic disturbances that attend the solar eruptions were due to a torrent of electrified particles which constituted a magnetic electric current. The opinion is also held by Camille Flammarion, the veteran French astronomer, who has expressed surprise at a storm of such unusual violence occurring at this time. M. Flammarion has pointed out that the sun is now at a period of maximum activity, the eruptions on the surface of the luminary recurring at intervals of 11 years. Sir Frank Dyson, the astronomer royal, declares the disturbances caused by the sun spots were the worst ever witnessed in England.
