

TO ASK \$900,000 TO CONSTRUCT SEWER

Bond Issue in That Sum Will Be Submitted at Special Election

70 DRAIN SOUTHWEST

Means Safety for Life and Property in the District Subject to Floods

A special election will be called as soon as legally possible to vote on the issuance of \$900,000 in bonds to build a storm sewer adequate for the needs of the Central park drainage district.

The report of the Freeborn Engineering company, which made an extensive survey of this proposed drainage project, advises the voters of a \$1,300,000 bond issue.

During the noon hour J. W. Freeborn, head of the engineering company, acting on this suggestion, made an estimate of the saving if the change was made.

According to the new specifications and estimate, there would be a sewer 12 to 16 feet in diameter from Boulder park, near Eighteenth and Main streets, to Eleventh street.

Plans call for a sewer and a ditch of sufficient capacity to adequately dispose of all storm water from this district.

When the bond election will be called has not been decided Friday. It was first thought best to hold it in connection with the primary election in March.

Kendallites and south sides pledged their support to the bond issue and they expect to get out on election day and work in the districts that will not be affected by this project.

One woman who lives on South Baltimore informed the mayor and Kendallites of the bond issue.

Several south sides suggested that money remaining in the bond issue voted six months ago be used to enlarge the sewer in their section.

South sides in turn were strenuously opposed to allowing Kendall to use his portion of the bond issue unless the outlet at Central park and Baltimore could be first enlarged to dispose of it.

So it was finally agreed the only effective remedy is the voting of a new bond issue sufficient to provide adequate drainage facilities for both districts.

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Both Sides Join Hands.

As one Kendallite expressed his sentiments: "You can't expect us to help pay for a sewer that will benefit only the south side; we are ready to join with the south sides in voting a bond issue to cover the whole project."

It was W. A. Marquis, a resident of the south side, who suggested that the sewer on Eleventh street be left open.

Rev. Ralph J. Lamb of Kendall, opposed the plan to give remaining sewer bond money to the south side.

"Water is standing several inches deep in some of our streets right now, simply because we have no sewer facilities. If we continue without sewers, the spring rains will cause tremendous damage to property."

Kendall's portion of the bond issue voted several months ago provides for a sewer from Kendall to Central park, where it is proposed to terminate the open sewer connecting it with the sewer running south to Eighteenth and Main.

ELECTION FRAUD HEARING BEGINS

Seek to Quash Indictment Against Okmulgee Ballot Counters

OKMULGEE, Feb. 3.—The foreman and five other members of the superior court grand jury now in session testified today in the hearing before Judge H. R. Christopher on motions to quash the indictments against Willard Sullivan and E. J. Kersting, prominent Okmulgee business men, on charges of fraud in conducting the 1920 election in the first ward of Henryetta where they were counters.

The hearing will be resumed at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow when other members of the grand jury will be examined relative to the evidence introduced before them on which the indictments were based.

MARES SUCCESS OF SUICIDE. Kaw City Man Dies After Shooting Himself; Wife Will Recover.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Representative Meyer London, socialist of New York, today introduced in the house a resolution declaring that it is "the sense of the house that the United States government should take part in the economic conference at Geneva."
