SAYS TRAVELING MEN SOON FLY

Rickenbacker Sees Rapid Progress in Business Methods

IS FAMOUS U. S. ACE

Plan "Jumps" by Airplane; Predicts Other Salesmen Soon Will Fly

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 3.—Traveling salesmen making their "jumps" between points by airplane is not a dream, but soon will be a reality.

Such is the statement of Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, American "king of the air" during the war, who will soon make an experiment of this kind. The flying "ace" is now connected with a machine which is his own product.

"Rick" designed the engine himself and is aiding in putting the car on the market. Plans travel to Tulsa for Rickenbacker, who says he will soon introduce the "traveling salesman of the air."

"Commercial flying will be a causal fact before long," he said, while here on a business trip. "For instance, I'm planning to cover a territory of 10,000 miles this spring in the interest of my business by plane, which would ordinarily take at least seven months and require several men for the job. I shall do this in one month."

Railroad Travel Irksome.
Col. A. F. Lorenzin, who accompanied Rickenbacker on his trip here, said railroad travel is very irksome for the man who has that he flies for the air and the speedy motor.

"On our way from New York to Chicago," the colonel said, "Eddie locked out of the window and remarked how foolish it was to take such a length of time to come from New York to Chicago. He said we should have been in Chicago many hours before the time that we arrived there."

Here Rickenbacker stepped back into the car. "That's a fact," he said. "It will be nothing in the future for one to fly from Chicago to New York, see a show, drop in for the Midnight Frolics on the roof, go down to the aerodrome, go to bed and reach Chicago by 6:30 or 7 the next morning. In plenty of time for ordinary business."

Eddie also contends that a trip could be made across the continent in 24 hours.

A QUEER KINK IN LAW

Decides A Colorado "Infant" May Accumulate a Multiplicity of Wives Legally.

DENVER, Feb. 3.—Male infants of Colorado may have as many wives as Solomon. There's no law in the Centennial state to stop 'em marrying early and often.

That is the gist of a decision handed down in the district court here by Judge G. H. Bradford, who refused to annul the marriage of Edith Walbel Patton, 14, to Lloyd L. Parsons, 13, Kansas farmer.

The mother of Mrs. Parsons sued to dissolve the union on the ground that both contracting parties were infants. The girl said her marriage was a prank, that she had never lived with her husband.

Judge Bradford uncovered an almost forgotten statute permitting the annulment of "infantile marriages" at the request of guardians of either the husband or wife.

"If every marriage of juveniles were annulled," it was pointed out by counsel for Parsons, "there is nothing to prevent our faithful Don Juan from taking out himself as many wives as King Solomon is reputed to have had. I do not believe this ancient law would stand a court test. The law would need a law to prevent the marriage of babies, and the repeal of statutes which make possible the easy breaking of marriage covenants. Unless parents can show coercion or undue influence on the part of one of the contracting parties the courts should refuse to dissolve unions of infants." To grant annulment would be to encourage polygamy.

This is the third time that the old annulment statute has been turned down in the district courts of Colorado.

A JOY TO THE POOR

"Toy Mission" Established in City of Pittsburgh Proves to Be a Sensational Success.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Feb. 3.—Among the several unusual institutions in this city is the Toy Mission. It was started 23 or 20 years ago and has flourished ever since.

In the long ago a citizen conceived the idea that each year there were thousands of toys cast aside by rich children after they had played with them for awhile. So this man proceeded to round up these discarded toys. Another prominent citizen furnished a storeroom, and here the toys were gathered. A handy craftsman put on a leg here and a touch of paint there, and presto! the toys were as good as new.

Then the aid of the newspapers was enlisted to ask citizens to turn in the names of little boys and girls who were too poor to share in Yuletide joys and who would not likely receive any toys.

Was there any response? There was and by the hundreds and thousands. It was surprising to know how many poor, toyless kids there were in this city.

The first year the stock of rejuvenated toys was not particularly large, but the toys were taken Christmas morning to a lot of little boys and girls about the city who otherwise would have had nothing to play with on Christmas day. The cheer these playthings brought to lonely kids cannot be estimated. It was a wonderful idea.

Came the next Christmas and the newspapers gave up columns of space boosting the toy mission and explaining its needs and what it could do. Dollies of every size, color and description poured in. That was not all. Steam engines, games and every gimcrack known to the toy world were donated. And every one found a sad but lonely and waiting kid.

So the years passed. More and more influential citizens were enlisted in this cause. Some bought lots of brand new toys, others contributed generous sums of cash to purchase these playthings.

The toy mission of Pittsburgh has grown to great proportions. Two weeks before Christmas each year may be seen hundreds of poor mothers, with from one to a dozen kids, picking out the treasures which they think their little ones will be pleased with. One, two or three toys are allotted to each child. Some are taken home by these poor parents, others are delivered Christmas morning.

Last Christmas, according to recent figures, 19,000 down-and-out kids in Pittsburgh were made happy by the work of the toy mission.

Two weeks before Christmas socially elite of aristocratic "rafton," a suburb, came to the mission to conduct a regular doll-dressing campaign.

It's not such a bad old world, after all.

SUB FOR TREASURE SEARCH

Miniature Craft Can Descend to Remarkable Sea Depths.

ROME, Feb. 3.—A miniature submarine having a capacity of about one cubic yard and operated by one man has been invented by an engineer of Trieste to recover treasure from ships lost at sea and now lying in the ocean depths.

The little submarine is attached to Francisco Kallin. It has an electric motor, a pump for expelling water and a device for changing the air within the submarine which will allow her to remain submerged for two hours.

The reflectors of 5,000 candle-power enable the worker to see clearly about him while immersed.
