Muskogee Times Over Estimates the Effect of Senator Quay's Speech in the Senate.

Commenting on Senator Quay's speech effecting statehood legislation, delivered in the Senate last Wednesday, the Muskogee Times says:

"All statehood legislation seems to be effectually blocked, though Senator Quay claims enough votes in the Senate to pass the omnibus bill. The speech made by Quay in the Senate Wednesday did Indian Territory more harm than can be undone by all the progressive citizens in the territory in ten years. Quay has outgeneraled Beveridge and the old war horse of the Senate seems to have the statehood matter under his thumb, so to speak."

The work of "all the progressive citizens in Indian Territory" cannot be thus minimized and neutralized by the intemperate speech of one who never saw the Indian territory and knows nothing of its people or its conditions, only that heard from others.

Representative Stevens of Texas has introduced in the House a bill regulating the practice of medicine and surgery in the Indian Territory. It provides that no person shall practice medicine or surgery as a profession without being registered in the office of the clerk of the court in the district in which he or she offers to practice. The bill also provides that the United States judge in each district of the territory shall create for that district a board of examiners to examine all applicants to practice.—Ex.

Sam Powell of the Indian Territory, who is in Washington to represent some of the people on the statehood question, says: "There is no more show for Indian Territory to come in with Oklahoma under the substitute bill in the Senate than there was for us to get it when the omnibus bill was up in the House. The substitute is practically dead. Its friends withdrew it. Whenever a vote can be had in the Senate the omnibus bill will pass, as it passed the House. Then the Moon bill will be forced to the front and, I think, passed. The telegrams and letters coming thanking Beveridge have hurt us some, for the reason that we started in to pass the Moon bill and switched too soon. They think us feeble, for no one regards Senator Beveridge's substitute seriously. Everyone here is sure that it

cannot pass, and knows also that it was offered to block legislation. I think I am perfectly faithful in the cause of relief for the Indian Territory, and would like to have the aid of all good people out there."
