

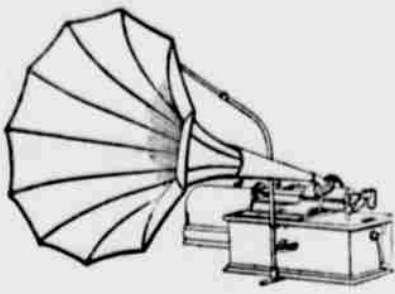

### NEGRO BOYS DROWN

CLASPED IN EACH OTHER'S ARMS THEY SANK TO THE BOTTOM.

George Stevens, aged 15 years, nephew of Ben Stevens, the well known barber in this town, and Manfred Jenkins, about the same age whose mother is employed at Orin Redfield's were playing around a pond north of town late yesterday afternoon and both lost their lives by drowning. The Stevens boy attempted to swim across the pond, while in the water about fifteen feet deep he sank. The boy could swim and it is believed by his family that he was attacked by cramps. The Jenkins boy, who was sitting at the water's edge with his clothing on, immediately dived into the pond to save his companion. The drowning boy clasped him and while locked in each other's arms they sank to the bottom. Their bodies were recovered an hour later. The remains will be buried this afternoon late in the colored cemetery. Both boys were negroes.
