HOW A DAIRY WAGON FIGURED IN ORIGIN OF THE WORK OF TRADE EXTENSION.

One merchant stopped on his way to see the mad rush of the horses, another stopped to see the spilled milk and still another came up. The three talked. Trade promotion was the theme, and out of the little meeting on the street when the milkman lost his milk grew the Trade promotion club. It is a youngster yet but all the people are joining. There are no knackers on a plan to extend the trade territory of the town. It will not interfere with the commercial club, but rather it will be the means of helping the club. The two organizations will work together.

"Just take the tax rolls" said one of the solicitors for members for the Trade Promotion Club today, "and you have the names of the members of the organization. Everybody is joining."

The business of the club will be transacted by twelve good business men who will compose the executive committee. In conjunction with this executive committee sub-committees will work and the problems will be met and solved as they are reached. The object of the club is a good one. The extension of the trade territory of the town means a bigger and better town.

The awarding of prizes for the best products will inevitably lead to a county fair. There is no other way out of it. Former fairs have been unsuccessful from a financial standpoint because too much was undertaken. The proper way to have these fairs at least for the beginning is to have displays arranged down town where live stock and farm products can be exhibited. Prizes can be awarded and the sights can be taken in without the price of an admission ticket. If there are shows and races on the sides let them be outside matters and dealt with in that manner.
