TWO BOOZE VIOLATORS FINED IN COUNTY COURT

NUMEROUS CASES DISMISSED BY COUNTY ATTORNEY FOR REASONS FILED WITH COURT.

Among the more important cases that have occupied the attention of the county court have been several booze charges, and in some of them dismissals were had for lack of evidence in court.

Luther Frost, who was held for compliance in the killing of little Luther Post, pleaded guilty to one case and was given the lowest penalty, a fine of \$50 and a term of thirty days on the county road. Another case of the same nature was dismissed for reasons filed by the county attorney.

Nine cases against John Tanner, charging him with violating the liquor laws were dismissed and stricken off the docket for reasons filed with the court by the county attorney.

A case against Bob Cotton, charging him with the same offense was dismissed by the county attorney.

Bill Hallow, charged with carrying concealed weapons was continued for the term.

James Whitfield, of Borwyn, against whom there was a charge of violating the liquor laws was heard by a jury, a verdict being returned pronouncing the defendant not guilty.

Jim Berry, charged with violating the booze law pleaded guilty and was given the least penalty, a fine of \$50 and 30 days on the roads. Another case of the same nature was dismissed.

The following cases have been disposed of by the court: Haggood vs. Kendrick; judgment rendered for plaintiff in the sum of \$50.

Jim Berry pleaded guilty to violation of liquor laws and fined \$50 and thirty days on the road. Three other cases of a like nature were dismissed by the county attorney.

Abie Endow and Homer Frye, charged with keeping a bawdy house, dismissed by the county attorney.

Ardmore Nat. bank vs. C. A. Pearce, verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$80.

T. A. Allen vs. J. H. Akers, suit in replevin, judgment by default for defendant in sum of \$40.

Katie Williamson, charged with keeping a bawdy house, dismissed by the county attorney at defendant's cost.

Emil John charged with pointing a deadly weapon, case continued.

Theo. Hoffman, prescribing medicine without a license, case dismissed.

Roy Pruitt, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs.

Joe Bastine, charged with violating liquor laws, case continued.

Jim Whitfield, two cases charging violation liquor laws, continued.

Frank Bonner, charged with gaming, verdict of guilty by jury and a fine of \$25 and costs.

Jeff Carson, charged with selling liquor, jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

A. L. Mitchell, dismissed, no evidence of drinking.

Jas. McClain and Ben Mobley, motion for new trial and case dismissed by the county attorney.

Joe Bastine, charged with violating liquor laws, two cases dismissed after having been continued by the court.

Roe Weeks, charged with gaming, pleaded guilty and fined \$25 and costs.

Farley Richmond, charged with gaming, pleaded guilty and fined \$25 and costs.
