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NEWSPAPER LAW OF OREGON.—Section 2882 of the laws of Oregon provides that whenever any person controlling a newspaper shall mail such newspaper to any person in this State without first receiving an order therefor, such newspaper shall be deemed to be a gift, and no debt or obligation shall accrue against such person, whether said newspaper is received by the person to whom it is sent or not.

Douglas County Republicans have selected an anti-Bourne delegation to the state and congressional conventions, which meet in Portland on May 14.

Secretary Garfield will visit Oregon in July. It is stated that while here he will personally inspect the Umatilla irrigation project, but it is not known whether he intends to visit Klamath or not.

Claiming that life at the Idaho penitentiary is far worse than death, because other prisoners refuse to have anything to do with him, and that he is completely isolated from human companionship, Harry Orchard has expressed the hope that the Idaho Board of Pardons will not interfere with the sentence of death pronounced by Judge Wood.

An exhibit at this point would attract the attention of thousands of tourists and homeseekers traveling on the main line and would be the means of inducing many to make a personal investigation of this country.

Eastern Oregon towns are reporting great success with their "Market days." At The Dalles recently 1500 outside people visited the town on one of these days. The farmers brought in their stock and held an auction and all the merchants gave bargain sales. An immense business was done and these "market days" are attracting attention wherever they have been tried.

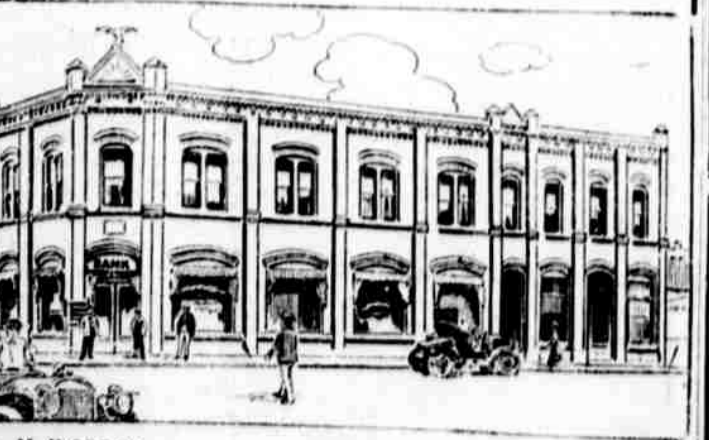
