ABBOTT TELLS TIME OF CHANGE

Mails Must Continue to Come via Pokagama as per Contract

MATTER IS DEPENDENT UPON HIS SAY SO

Contrary to the Statements of the Manager of the Klamath Lake Railroad the Postmaster is Daily Expecting Orders to Route Mails By Dorris

Postmaster Emitt has as yet received no instructions to route the mail via Dorris but the orders are expected at any time. When Mail Route Inspector W. Valle was here several weeks ago he stated that they would recommend a temporary service be established on the 10th of May. The Government always moves slowly in such matters and consequently it may be a few days before the service will be started. Valle also stated that he would recommend that the service via Pokagama be discontinued when the new route was begun. It is generally expected that this will be done regardless of the wishes of the Klamath Lake Railroad or any other corporation or individual. It appears that some one has written to E. S. Abbott, the general manager of the Klamath Lake road, asking him when the new route would be opened for he has mailed the following communication to the Herald:

County Gets Road Funds

County Treasurer L. Alva Lewis has received in round numbers \$4750 from the State Treasurer which is Klamath County's share of the five per cent land sale fund. The state receives from the Government 5 per cent of the money derived from the sale of public lands and the money so received is apportioned among the counties of the state and goes into the road fund. It can be used for no other purpose than the improvement of public highways. Klamath County now has approximately \$14,000 in the road fund, a sum sufficient to put some of the roads in fine condition.

Hauling Lumber

Several large loads of lumber have been hauled out to Maney Brothers & Company's camp. All hands are busy establishing quarters for the Summer. The first work on the ditch will probably be done tomorrow. The contractors did not bring in a full crew with them, but will employ a number of men as soon as they get the actual construction work started.

Mines Looking Up

Reports from the mines at New Pine Creek are to the effect that a great amount of development work will be done this Summer. Eastern capitalists are taking hold of some of the properties and development work will be carried on this season on a scale far more extensive than during the time since the prospects were discovered.

Before adjourning the County Court decided to advertise for bids for the bridge across Lost river at the Upper Gap. If a satisfactory bid is received the bridge will be built this Summer.

Considerable freight is still coming via Pokagama. Two carloads were landed there today. The McIntire Company will maintain offices there for at least two months longer.

ROOSEVELT IS FACING A TEST

Election of a United States Senator in Oregon Will Be Taken as a Verdict for or against the National Administration and Its Policies

A great many Republicans are beginning to soberly ask themselves "Why should we elect Governor Chamberlain to the United States Senate?"

And to this echo is answered, "Why indeed?"

But in the matter of a United States Senator they have presented to them a different problem. There they come in touch with the party of the Nation, the party of Roosevelt, of which they so warmly approve, and the verdict which they render the general public must accept as very largely the judgement of the voters of Oregon upon that administration. Our elections occur at a strange season of the year. We here fire the first gun of the presidential election. The verdict is made up in advance, so far as the rest of the country is concerned. The Nation knows that the State is overwhelmingly Republican. It likewise knows that the administration of President Roosevelt has here received enthusiastic approval. That administration, disguise it as we will, is now on trial before the country. By the general masses of the people it has been warmly approved; by the corporate and plutocratic interests it is bitterly reviled, and while little is being done openly, there is deep down a smouldering fire of resentment that cannot be extinguished. For the very reason that plutocratic forces of the country hate the President, the masses of the people admire and approve him.

If under such circumstances as these it goes forth that the people of Oregon in June elect a Democrat for United States Senator, the administration receives a blow in the house of its supposed friends that it is conceivable may have a serious effect upon the plans of the friends of the administration and upon the great contest in November following. It must not be forgotten that much quiet work has been done in recent months against the administration. One may see the effect of it on every hand in every community—the claqueurs busily engaged in hamstringing Roosevelt, and insidiously undermining the platform of principles which he has been steadily putting forth in his mes-

sages and speeches. If a well known and supposedly safe administration State falls by the wayside in June, the prestige of the administration severely suffers and no man who honestly faces the question can see it otherwise.

In the present campaign and the coming election Statement No. 1. is not on trial, because both candidates for the United States Senate stand square toed and flat footed upon that platform. Neither is Chamberlain or Cake, as such, on trial before the people. The question is not one of these men, but of broad National import, leading to a victory which will mean a shout of ringing encouragement to the National administration or a vital blow delivered in the house of its friends. This is the real proposition before the people of the State, and it is one of the main reasons why The Telegram will throughout this campaign give H. M. Cake its heartiest support and urge as strongly as it may the voters of the State to sustain the administration at a moment when it is more seriously on trial than at any other period in its whole history. —Portland Evening Telegram, May 4th 1908.

Building The Court House

Despite the fact that the fight for the removal of the county seat of Lake county is still red hot the authorities are going ahead with the construction of the new court house at Lakeview. Parties coming from there say that the stone and brick work is progressing splendidly under the direction of W. A. Wingate, formerly of this city. There is now a possibility that the measure will not be submitted at the June election. The petition asking that the question be submitted has the required number of signers, but a number of these have grown disgusted with the fight being made by the newspapers and have asked the county court to withdraw their names from the petition. FARMERS' INSTITUTE ASSURED

Illustrated Lectures and Discussions Will Be Beneficial to Farmers and Stock Raisers--Adjourned Meeting of Water Users to Be Held at Same Time

Dredge Not Working

W. H. Kent, who has charge of the dredge on the railroad dike across the marsh, was in the city Saturday. He stated that the repairs for the dredge had not been received and that no work was being done. The wood work on the new dredge was being done and in a short time the machinery would be on hand and as soon as it can be put on the barge the new dredge will be put in operation. The old one will be repaired shortly and the two machines will be put on the job. It is now almost three weeks since any work has been done on the dike. This is a good season for work and every day that is lost means delay in the extension of the road to this city.

Will Open Office

E. P. Morgan has returned from California where he has been for several weeks on an important real estate deal at Roseville. He is now making arrangements to open his office in the building near the Hurn hardware store. While at Oakland he purchased his office furniture and it will arrive here within a few days.

Registration Closes Soon

Registration for the general election closes on the 15th, and up to date there are 748 voters registered in Linkville precinct. This is enough to make three precincts and at the proper time this Fall the County Court will make the division. The total registration of the county will be approximately 1600. All of those who have not registered should do so, before Friday.

Secretary C. P. Chastain, of the Klamath Water Users' Association, is in receipt of a letter from James Whitycombe director of the Oregon Experimental station at Corvallis, informing him that he and Professor Bradley, the chemist at the station, can come to assist in the Farmers' Institute to be held on June 5th and 6th, the time set for the adjourned meeting of the Water Users' Association.

Mr. Whitycombe states that on the night of the 5th they would give an illustrated lecture on the various types and breeds of livestock, and also showing the Agricultural College and its work which is of interest to everyone. On the following day the discussion of subjects pertaining to animal husbandry, plant food in the soil, chemistry of the soil, and other subjects of importance to the farmer could be taken up.

This institute will be held at a time of the year when farmers will have time to attend and in order to make the gathering a success it will be necessary for all the stock raisers and farmers to attend the session. Valuable information can be got by attending institutes of this nature for those who attend are given the benefit of years of experiments with various breeds of stock and kinds of soil and crops.

The meeting of the Water Users' Association and the Institute should bring every farmer and stockman in the Klamath basin to this city on June 5th and 6th. This will be the first Farmers' Institute to be held in this county and if it is made a success it will make it possible for this county to secure one of these meetings every year.

Vote on Saloons

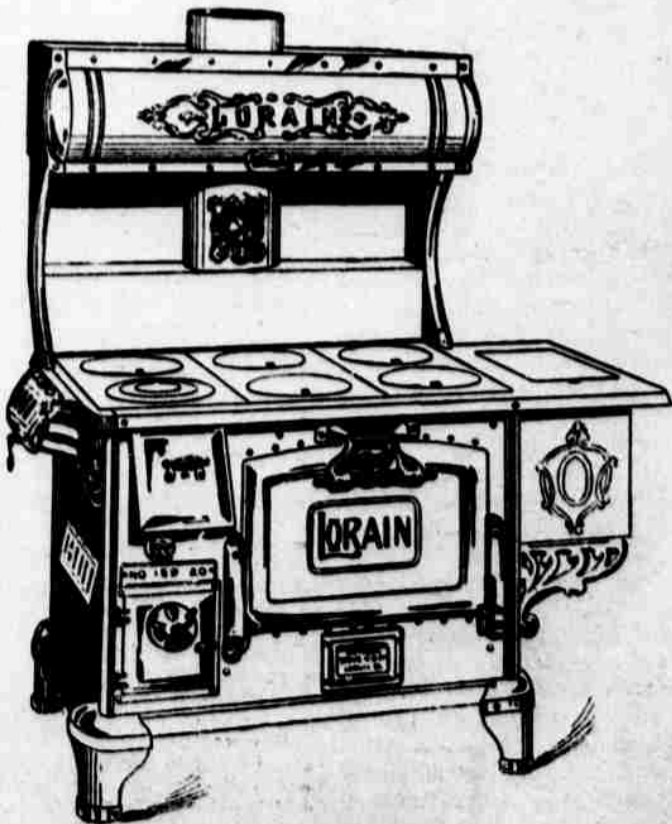
