Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is very much displeased with the anti-injunction plank in the republican platform. He states that it was not an anti-injunction plank that the convention adopted, but a pro-injunction plank. The only difference, he says, between the Republican party's principles now and before the convention is that people who are to be enjoined shall have notice.

Army men are greatly interested in a new gun invented by N. Pouteaux, a French engineer. Pouteaux says the gun will fire 1,200 bullets a minute by the use of electricity, no powder being used or no explosion resulting. The claims made for the gun are so sweeping that experts are inclined to be skeptical, but a thorough trial will be made. Should it prove effective it will mean a revolution in artillery.

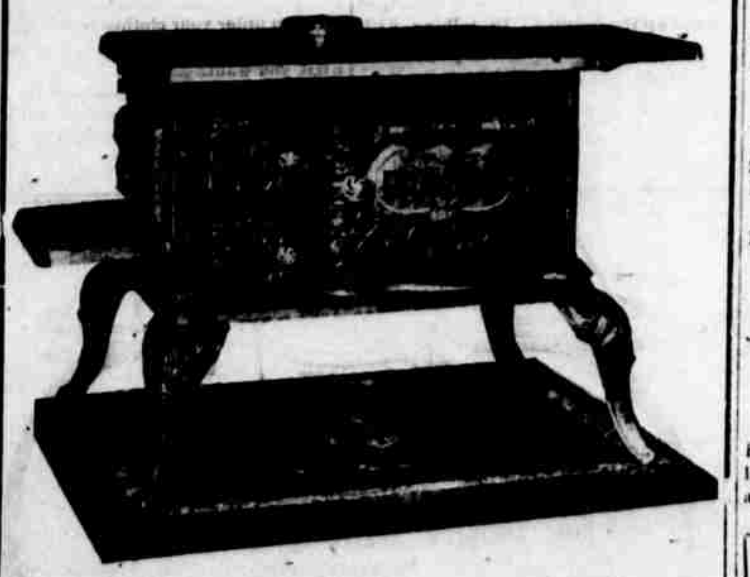
"The restraining power of the court of equity should be enlarged and not diminished," was the comment made by the Associate Justice Brewer of the United States Supreme Court, in commenting on the injunction plank in the Chicago platform. "I look upon the action of the convention as a step backward toward barbarism."

A test case was made recently in Alabama, of the local option law and the general prohibition act. It was taken up to the Supreme Court of the state from the lower courts, and the decision declares both laws valid in every particular.

In a personal letter to a close friend, John Mitchell, the noted labor leader, intimates that he would accept the nomination for the vice-presidency on the democratic ticket with Bryan if tendered to him. He says that while he is not an aspirant for political preferment, he holds that no citizen has a right to refuse to perform a public service when a general demand is made on him. He mentions the fact that he is being pressed to become a candidate for governor of Illinois but does not intimate what he will do in the matter.

A peculiar sentence has been pronounced by Judge Cameron, of Portland. H. A. Lawson, a 19 year old boy, convicted of vagrancy, was sentenced by the Judge to "Quit cigarettes and go to bed every night before 9 o'clock."

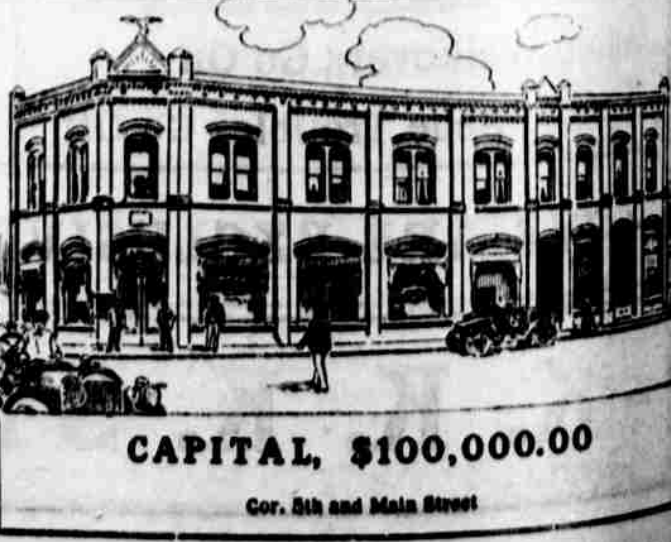
