FEE LOOKS FOR TRAVEL TO CAL. HEAVY WINTER

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24.—That business conditions in the Pacific coast states are better than in the middle west and the east is the opinion of Chas. S. Fee, passenger traffic manager, Southern Pacific company, who has just returned from an extended trip which took him to all parts of the United States. Mr. Fee believes that travel to the Pacific coast this next winter will be heavier than last. "I have just returned from a 12,000 mile journey covering a ten weeks' period," says Mr. Fee, "during which time I visited all of the Southern Pacific general agencies in the United States. This journey embraced a visit of from one to four or five days in some twenty five of the leading cities of the country. "I returned from this trip with the impression that general business conditions on the Pacific coast

in all territory between San Diego and Vancouver were quite, if not more favorable, than in the middle and eastern states. The condition in the states east and southeast of the Missouri river seemed to vary considerably as between different localities in the same states but all signs seemed to point to the fact that business has definitely turned the corner although there was evidence of skidding in some sections. "Our agents generally report that the Pacific coast will have travel this coming winter considerably in excess of the season a year ago, although it is a fact that outbound steamers for Europe from Atlantic coast ports are carrying many sight-seers and tourists who visited California during the winter 1919-20, which merely emphasizes the fact that the Pacific coast should be up and doing if they want to hold and increase the volume of eastern traffic which they have heretofore enjoyed."
