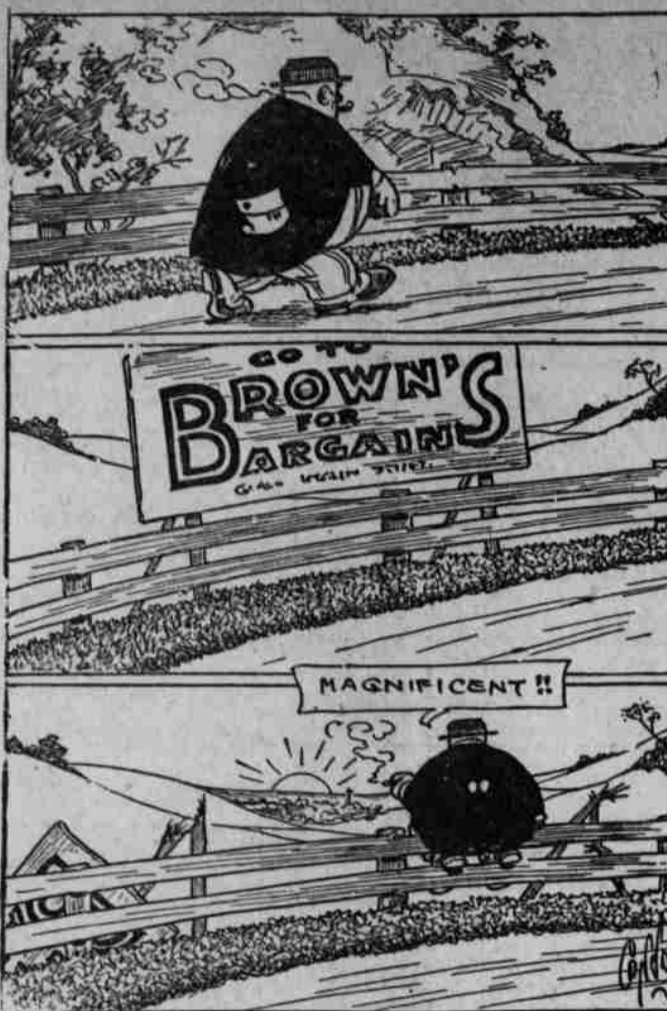

In Coffee Futures Market

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—The market for coffee futures opened at a decline of 12 to 45 points; sold 16 to 21 points net lower during the early trading, under continued liquidation and scattering pressure accompanied by reports that Brazilian shippers had accepted lower bids for Rio coffees in the spot and freight market late yesterday. The decline to 7.70 for December and 8.22 for March attracted more or less covering, however, and there were partial recoveries later on buying by brokers with cotton exchange or foreign connections. March rallied to 8.35 with the market closing at a net loss of 7 to 10 points. September 7.39; October 7.48; Dec. 7.82; Jan. 8.01; March 8.36; May 8.81; July 8.77.

Spokane Millers Reduce

Flour 10 Cents Barrel

SPOKANE, Sept. 24.—A reduction of 40c barrel in the wholesale of flour from \$13 to \$12.50 was announced by millers here today. A corresponding reduction will be made in the retail price within a few days, retailers stated.

Corn Goes Under \$1

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—For the first time since 1917 corn today commanded less than \$1 a bushel in exchange for new crop deliveries. Continued fine weather pointing to a huge yield safe from frost was largely responsible. The market closed heavy, 5 5-8 to be net lower with Dec. 99 1-4 to 99 1-2 and Sept. 1.27 to 1.27 1/2. Wheat finished unsettled at decline to 1-4c advance, Dec. 2.26 1/4 to 2.34 3-4 and March 2.27 to 2.27 1/4. Oats lost 2 to 2 1-4c and provisions closed unchanged to 3/4c down.

As soon as the market opened corn started to plunge downward and although rallies took place they proved brief.

Rails and Industrials Pursue Divergent Courses

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Rails and industrials pursued widely divergent courses in today's very active stock market, the former, especially low priced issues, scoring additional gains, while the latter became more unsettled as signs of "business readjustment" multiplied.

That is readjustment is taking the form of pronounced price revision was clearly indicated by the news that two prominent mail order houses have cut prices from 10 to 50 per cent, while the manufacture of a well known automobile announced a price reduction of 17 1-2 to 21 1-2 per cent.

There were rumors that coming weeks are likely to witness a marked slowing down of operations in the steel trade with probable reductions of prices for fabricated materials.

The more severe losses were again sustained by motors and affiliated specialties, oils, steels, equipments, shippings and some of the food shares where gross declines extended from 1 to 6 points with partial rallies on short covering at the close.

Many of the mines are still flooded but the pumping out continues.
