A BLAST AT M'KINLEYISM.

The Oregonian indicts McKinley and declares him not up to the requirements of the office of president. It asserts that the administration has made most disgraceful appointments to office at the behest of unscrupulous politicians, has betrayed the civil service to the spoiler, has paralyzed the organization of the army, has violated its pledges as to currency reform, has humiliated its most efficient servants and discredited American intelligence and valor in the eyes of the world. It has hesitated, timorously, dilatory. It has paltered and equivocated. Its policy has been to drift, its course has been to sacrifice vital national interest on the altar of partisan and personal politics. So the Oregonian names some men, either of whom it would like to see nominated for president in lieu of McKinley. They are Theodore Roosevelt, Seth Low, Charles Francis Adams, John D. Long, Henry Cabot Lodge, John C. Spooner and Benjamin Harrison.

PINGREE NOT FOR M'KINLEY.

It was reported by telegraph that Pingree, the Republican-Populist governor of Michigan was for Alger for senator and for McKinley, "first, last and all the time." Such seems not to be the case.

Governor Pingree has made a statement, brought out by dispatches from Washington quoting General Alger as saying that "Governor Pingree is for President McKinley first, last and all the time." Said the governor:

"If General Alger said that it is his opinion from his point of view. The question whether I am for President McKinley lies with the president, not me. If General Alger knows that President McKinley is opposed to territorial expansion and is not an advocate of the murder and the destruction being visited upon the innocent Filipino, he has a right to say that I am for McKinley. If General Alger is informed that McKinley is opposed to trusts and to legislation which fosters, creates and encourages them, and in favor of legislation to restrict and suppress them, then I am closer to the opinions of McKinley than has generally been believed. If General Alger is assured that President McKinley is not in touch and sympathy with the disputable political methods of Mark Hanna and his friends and all that precinct such leadership, then I am for McKinley.

"The question of whether I favor McKinley is of no consequence in this sensitive matter. I am for McKinley in everything he does which I consider right; and against everything he does which I consider wrong."

Mayor Shot.
MCKINNAIS, Mich., June 30.—Mayor James Ballinroe was shot and killed today by J. W. Taylor, a disappointed office seeker. Taylor then fired a shot through his own breast and died almost instantly.

ENGLAND AND THE BOERS.

There is no changes in the situation that seems to drive England into a war with the Transvaal Republic. It will be a war to enable capital to exploit a peaceful Christian agricultural country. Joseph Chamberlain, in a recent speech said:

"The transvaal's enormous secret service fund has procured it friends and advocates in every country. Its misgovernment is a fostering error, poisoning the whole atmosphere of South Africa. The British government, in Natal would be in the happiest condition, but so long as the disease of hatred and suspicion prevails in the transvaal, it is impossible to stop the contagion."

There is over the whole situation a hating hesitating dubious atmosphere. England knows that morally she is in the wrong.

THE OREGONIAN AND ALTGELD.

A Republican paper at Portland has been pouring hot shot into Mr. McKinley and his administration, apparently forgetful of what it has recently been saying that until the Filipinos are quenched the man who criticizes the administration or any of its acts or creatures is a copperhead and a traitor.

Replying to a criticism, it says that it "possibly may be able to do something for the great political principles it advocates, by holding up to reprobatation those in high places who are unfaithful to them; and at any rate it can have the satisfaction of uttering an independent and untrammelled opinion."

"These be brave words, withal. But why not pass it around and let some of the rest of us express 'an honest and untrammelled opinion, occasionally?'"

The Tacoma Ledger, Rep., condemns the Oregonian as "a common scold." It says editorially:

"Political animosities make strange bedfellows, as well as political friendships. The strangest of these is seen in the harping on the same string by the Portland Oregonian and John P. Altgeld. 'Mr. Altgeld, who has just returned from a tour through the South, gives the war cry of the Democracy in the next campaign, which he asserts will be effective. Sixteen to one will not be placed in the front rank, but the hypocrisy of the McKinley administration will be shown up in every phase. This is to be the bugle-note to arouse the masses, with incidentally a few side issues for special classes; to let the farmer, who sees the havoc the gold standard has made, and that free silver is the only panacea. Trusts will be harped on for the retainers of anti-expansion in the cities, where live the relatives of the volunteers.

"While The Oregonian does not pipe to the tune of 10 to 1, it is fully in accord with 'Bro' Altgeld on the main issue. No more bitter or unjust attack has been made upon President McKinley by any opposition journal than that in The Oregonian of Friday. It consistently followed a previous bitter and logical attack on the Republican party in congress because reform legislation had not been enacted, ignoring the silver majority in the senate, which has effectually blocked such action."

"The Oregonian asserts the McKinley administration is the cause of about all the ills this nation is heir to. It criticizes and magnifies everything that can be tortured into a fault and makes a crime of it, and draws a distressing picture of this country under four years more of its administration."

"Not a word is said in all this column of vituperation of the many virtues of the president, of its many notable achievements and the prosperity that has been largely due to the administration. No word of praise is given President McKinley for his heroic stand in preventing the blunder of the century by recognizing the so-called Cuban Republic. Nothing but criticism and magnifying of minor errors."

"That President McKinley has made mistakes his most ardent admirers cannot deny, but he has proved altogether the best executive this nation has had since Lincoln; and has won the confidence, respect and admiration of people of all sections, and will be re-nominated and re-elected by the unanimous vote of the Republicans and honest money men of all parties, by a larger majority than ever before. In spite of the opposition and criticism of the Oregonian it is safe to venture the assertion that the Oregon delegation will cast their unanimous vote for the nomination of President McKinley and that his majority in Oregon will be largely increased over that of 1896. The cause of the Oregonian's opposition is well known."
