

ZION STILL MOVES

Dowie Remains in Charge of All its Industries

Says He Is "Rid of Stinkpots and Devil Parasites for Good and All"

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Zion City is nearly normal this morning. Faith in Dowie's ability to raise the coin is still good. Employees of the lace mills and other industries have accepted trade orders on the stores for payment of wages. There was a great

rush on the stores, as many, who had exhausted their cash, had been in actual want of food for the past few days. They have confidence, despite the bank's remaining closed, that Dowie's statement that he is "now rid of stinkpots and devil parasites for good and all" will be verified. Dowie has issued a notice that the "vipers of the press" won't be admitted to the city again. The court this morning issued an order that Dowie remain in charge of the industries, as he is better able to manage them than an outsider. He must regularly report to the receivers.

Roeski is passive and dull witted, and a degenerate. He is 18 years old.

AGED COUPLE MURDERED

Bodies Found Today Buried Near Their Recent Home

Charles Bonier Arrested for the Crime--He Claims to Have Bought the Old Folks Property

Buffalo, Dec. 3.—The police this morning discovered the bodies of Franz Frahr and his wife buried in a shed near the residence, from which they mysteriously disappeared November 20th. Their skulls had been crushed with a hammer, which was afterwards found in the shed. A search for Charles Bonier, who moved into the house the day after the Frahrs disappeared, resulted in his arrest at Erie this morning. Frahr and his wife were each past 80 years old. Messenger Was Under Age.
Oregon City, Dec. 3.—T. F. Cowing, local manager of the Western Telegraph Company Wednesday discharged Roy Ringo, the messenger, on instructions received from the Child Labor Commission of this state. Young Ringo is only 13 years of age, and the attention of the labor commission was called to his case by Mrs. Sarah Evans, of Oswego, this county, who is a member of the commission.

Manager Cowing was notified by letter from Mrs. Trumbull, secretary of the commission, that Ringo, being under the required legal age of 14 years, his immediate discharge as messenger in the employ of the telegraph company was demanded. The lad is not physically strong, having lung trouble, and a local physician has made a statement to the effect that the physical condition of the lad necessitates outdoor life; that the confinement of a school room would be detrimental.

This is the first instance, locally in which the state child labor commission has interfered in any way with the employment of minors.

Big Sums for Human Life.
Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 3.—A jury in the United States district court this afternoon gave a verdict against the Southern Pacific Company in the largest amount ever awarded for the loss of a human life in this state.

In the suit of Mrs. Cora Vernon against the railroad company for \$60,000 as compensation for the death of her husband, who was killed in the disastrous wreck near Martinez, on December 20, 1902, the jury returned a verdict awarding Mrs. Vernon \$27,500.

Charged With Bribery.
Kansas City, Dec. 3.—State Senator Jesse Jewell surrendered today, to answer the charge of soliciting a \$2000 bribe for himself and two other senators to vote against the baking powder trust. He pleaded not guilty, and was released under bonds.

STORM TRIES THEM

Submarine Torpedo Boats Threatened Today

Navy Department Has Rushed the Yankton to Their Assistance, Life Savers Watching Them

Norfolk, Dec. 3.—There is a terrific storm off the Atlantic coast today. The government submarine torpedo boat Moccasin is in distress three miles off the shore. The submarine boat Adder is standing by, apparently under control. The gunboat Peoria is trying to tow the Moccasin. Life savers at the station are waiting for the sea to subside, when they will go to the rescue.

The navy department has rushed the Yankton to Cape Henry to aid the Moccasin and Adder.

Paris, Dec. 3.—A dispatch received here from Constantinople says the governments of Austria and Russia have not yet acknowledged the reply of the Porte to their joint note concerning the Macedonian reforms, and unless the reform scheme is accepted unconditionally they will address an ultimatum to the Sultan.
