**CITY**  
**COUNCIL**  
**MEETS**

**An Adjourned Session in**  
**Which a Great Deal of**  
**Business Was not Done**

The city council held an adjourned  
 meeting last night for the purpose of  
 taking final action upon the matter of  
 constructing a sewer through block 2  
 in the Charles Cartwright addition to  
 the City of Salem. Acting upon the  
 advice of the city attorney, however,  
 they delayed final action until an ad-  
 vertisement giving notice of the pro-  
 posed sewer should be published in one  
 of the city papers for 10 days.

Instead of adjourning when this was  
 settled, they proceeded to transact a  
 large amount of other business, and  
 engage in a number of lengthy dis-  
 cussions.

The fire committee made a vain effort  
 to have the council purchase five new  
 fire hydrants, but although they tried  
 in different ways to get it through,  
 action was blocked every time by Alder-  
 man Gesner. He objected to the  
 cost of the hydrants, but failed to sug-  
 gest any plan whereby they could be  
 secured cheaper. A motion finally pre-  
 vailed, instructing the fire chief to  
 ascertain the cost of hydrants in Port-  
 land and to report his findings at the  
 next meeting of the council.

An ordinance which relieves the  
 property owners and the city of the  
 necessity of establishing a grade be-  
 fore they can construct board walks in  
 outlying districts of the city, was in-  
 troduced by Alderman Wallace. After  
 clearly explaining to the council the ne-  
 cessity of the ordinance, he succeeded  
 in having the rules suspended, and  
 the bill read the third time and placed  
 on its final passage. It passed without  
 a dissenting vote.

Street Commissioner Kurtz was in-  
 structed to purchase 40,000 feet of  
 bridge timber needed by the city, from  
 the Spaulding Lumber Company, at  
 \$8.50 per thousand. The lumber is to  
 be delivered as needed.

The application of M. L. Hamilton  
 for a saloon license was referred to the  
 license committee.

Alderman Hughes moved that the city  
 marshal be instructed to enforce the  
 ordinance prohibiting expectorating on  
 the sidewalks, and in public buildings,  
 but the motion failed to carry. In mak-  
 ing his motion he stated that numerous  
 complaints had been made to him re-  
 garding the filthy condition of the side-  
 walks in certain quarters of the city.  
 The councilmen voting against the  
 measure were opposed to giving the  
 marshal instructions in regard to doing  
 his duty.

Recorder Moores was instructed to  
 draw a warrant in favor of John Doynes  
 for the amount of the city's share in the  
 expenses of repairing the steel  
 bridge.

The committee on ways and means  
 reported favorably upon the report of  
 the recorder for the months of July  
 and August, and the report was adopt-  
 ed.

Upon motion of Alderman Hughes,  
 the vote on the High street improve-  
 ment was reconsidered and voted  
 down. It was then amended so as to  
 call for gravel instead of crushed rock,  
 and carried. This amendment was  
 made at the request of the bulk of the  
 property owners to be effected by the  
 improvement. The proposed improve-  
 ment extends from the north line of  
 Trade street to the south line of Rural  
 Avenue.
