storm of hisses. Jordan then announced that Britt would have no other. The crowd cheered wildly, and then gave three hearty cheers for the undefeated champion. Demanding a speech, Jeffries said: "Gentlemen, all I have to say is that I thank you from the bottom of my heart." The spectators set up a cry for George Siler, but Siler did not respond.
Announcer Jordan again addressed the crowd as follows: "Nolan refuses absolutely to enter the ring unless either Siler or Graney will referee. He is willing to accept either of these men. 'Spider' Kelly, on behalf of Britt, then said: 'We will accept Eddie Graney.'"
Then followed a scene of much excitement.
Coffroth then sent a messenger at once to notify Nolan of Britt's selection. Siler was then brought into the ring and introduced to the crowd.
Jordan then announced that the Britts will accept the referee in order to get Nelson to fight.
2:25—The fight is now assured, and Nelson has been ordered to enter the ring. Graney has appeared in the ring and will referee the Britt-Nelson fight.
During all the squabbling Britt sat in the corner originally selected for him looking determined and smiling to his friends at the ringside. At 2:33 p. m. Nelson appears.
He was tremendously hooted by the crowd present. Nelson's face bore several abrasions, the result of training knocks. Nelson was quickly introduced. Britt was also introduced as a Native Son of the Golden West, and the pride of California, Jimmy Gardner posted \$1000, and challenged the winner. Herrera was also present with a challenge. Nelson's seconds are Jack Coyle and Planders. Manager Nolan declared all bets off. It was further stated that this was done to insure a fight strictly on its merits. This announcement was cheered.
2:48 p. m.—The ring is now being cleared for action.
Announcer Jordan said: "It will be a 45-round contest, Marquis of Queensberry rules, and break at order of referee."

FIRE AND POWDER

Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 9.—All the employes in the Rand powder works were killed in two explosions at 9:30 this morning.

Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 9.—The powder works six miles from here, were blown up today. There were 50 employes, and it is believed many were killed.

Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 9.—Four car loads of powder on the side track at the Rand powder works, near Fairchance, exploded this morning. Five are known to be dead and scores injured. It is believed 25 are buried in the wrecked cars and buildings. Manager Rand and a boy named Wininger are fatally hurt.

Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 9.—It is stated that 40 are missing. The debris is scattered over a wide territory, and parts of human bodies show through the wreckage. The tracks of the B. & O. is torn up, and trolleys are down. A train passing had every window broken, and several passengers are reported hurt. Manager Rand insisted on being carried to the telephone, and talked to his wife to reassure her.

Connellsville, Pa., Sept. 9.—Two cars of dynamite cannot be removed from the debris, which is burning, and are momentarily expected to explode. Thousands who rushed to the scene are now flying panic-stricken, fearful of a second disaster. Twelve bodies have been recovered, burned beyond recognition.

Aged Lady Dead.
Mrs. Sarah Bowker passed away this morning at the home, corner of Winter and Trade streets, aged 76. Old age was the cause of her death. The funeral services will be held tomorrow at the residence at 2:30, and interment will be had in the Lee Mission cemetery. Rev. Selbeck will conduct the services.
