LIND STILL SAYS "NOTHING DOING"

Minneapolis Man Now in Portland Will Not Accept Candidacy For Governorship of Minnesota Which Is Being Forced on Him

PORTLAND, Aug. 16.—Although he declared that he is still determined not to accept the candidacy for the governorship of Minnesota, which the Minnesota democratic convention recently thrust upon him despite his protests, John Lind of Minneapolis, in Portland this afternoon, showed by his words and actions that he will in all probability make the race.
At the hotel Portland this afternoon Lind and John E. Buchard, a prominent St. Paul democrat politician, lunched together and held a long conference.

To Save Ship Soon

VICTORIA, Aug. 16.—That the steamer Princess May, which went aground near Sentinel island, Alaska, is now being prepared to be pulled off the reef and will be ready for service again by the first of October, is the prediction today of Captain Troup, manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway coast service from the scene of the wreck.
The vessel, it is expected, will be floated at flood tide tomorrow. She has 31 plates damaged and her frames will have to be repaired and renewed.

\$7000 A DAY IS FIRE LOSS

Estimate Given Out by Forestry Bureau Shows That Fighting of Forest Fires Is an Expensive Business.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Seven thousand dollars a day is what it is costing the government to fight the forest fires in the northwest, according to estimates given out today by the forestry service. This enormous drain upon the public treasury is the result of the most disastrous series of conflagrations that have occurred since the establishment of the bureau.
Associate Forester Albert F. Potter expresses his belief that the worst of the destruction is past. He believes that by this time the army and the rangers have the flames under control.

MacARTHUR OFF TO SALT LAKE IN BENSON'S PLACE

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—C. N. MacArthur, speaker of the Oregon house, and secretary to the governor, left for Salt Lake City today where he will represent acting Governor Bowerman and the state of Oregon at the conference of Western governors scheduled for August 18.

The proposed meeting was suggested by Governor Hay of Washington and its purpose is to secure the ideas of the chief executives of the Western states on conservation and the forestry situation for presentation to the conservation congress at St. Paul.

WOMAN SAYS SOCIETY FOLK SMOKE TOO MUCH

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—The Colony club, the wealthiest and most exclusive woman's club in America, is in the throes of internal strife for the second time in a year over revelations of drinking and cigarette smoking among its members. Dr. Eugene Hancock, for six years physician at the Hotel Martha Washington and now the regular attendant upon the bulk of the members of the Colony club, has laid herself open to ostracism from fashionable patronage. Dr. Hitchcock, in an interview, said the women of New York were drinking and smoking themselves into insane asylums and living such unhealthy lives that their children were destined to be degenerates before they were born.

The woman physician, warming to her subject, said:

"All of the fashionable women that I know have the cigarette habit. College girls are taking up the cigarette habit. Business women smoke. Of course, there is a well known fact that there have been many inveterate smokers among society women for years. At the Colony club cigarettes are regularly passed around after forenoon socials and presentation meals.

TO INVEST LARGE AMOUNT IN CANADA

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 16.—Millions of dollars are to be invested in Canada, including British Columbia, as a result of the tour now being made by the Earl of Dunmore, Norton Griffin, M. P., and Harry Brittain, three of the leading imperialists of Great Britain.

They have already purchased 140,000 acres of prairie land and 12,000 acres of fruit lands in Okanogan valley. Griffiths says this is only the beginning of the purchases the syndicate in which he is interested intends to make. The land is to be settled by families from Great Britain who will largely belong to the type of farm laborers.

Engineer Dies in Wreck

EVERETT, Wash., Aug. 16.—Engineer Barney Finnegan of Seattle was killed and Fireman Bowers slightly injured in a Northern Pacific freight wreck at Arlington, 20 miles north of Everett, early today. From the depot where the Darrington branch leaves the main line, and was caused by spreading rails.

Finnegan's body will be taken to Seattle. The engine overturned, crushing Finnegan under it.
