Through the efforts of the Parent-Teachers' circle and congress of Mothers of Medford, an educational bureau has been established. This is an organization for all the mothers and their friends who are interested in the child's best welfare in southern Oregon. Its headquarters are located in the Medford public library, where a pleasant room has been furnished. After September 1 this room will be open every Saturday afternoon. There will always be some one in charge to register the babies and give advice along the problems that perplex so many mothers. All mothers who have small children, and especially young babies, are urged to have them registered and some time during October Mrs. McMath, the state president, will visit this bureau and a baby test will be given. The child of today is the man or woman of tomorrow, and to be strong men and women the child must be well cared for from infancy. We will give a few of the main objects of the educational bureau:

To bring to the parents a knowledge of parental influences, a knowledge of infant hygiene, the adolescence age and sex hygiene, and the training of the child. To show by eugenic tests correct standard measurements for babies and to suggest such treatment as will correct defects shown by these tests. To demonstrate from time to time by lectures the proper care of the babe, including food and clothing. To bring into closer relationship the home and the school that parent and teacher may co-operate intelligently in the education of the child. To surround the child with that loving wise care in the impressive years of its life that will develop good citizens instead of lawbreakers and criminals. It is said no state in the Union is looking after the child's welfare from its earliest infancy as is the state of Oregon. The members of the bureau are very desirous of having the mothers of the neighboring towns and country to visit the mothers' rest room and take advantage of this splendid opportunity for the better care of the children. The whole county should be interested in this movement, and by their personal help and financial aid make it possible for the bureau to secure the services of a trained nurse who would have general charge of this work and be able at all times to give advice and assistance. The children are a nation's greatest asset, therefore they should be the first to be considered and provided for. Any one having magazines and literature that would be helpful along these lines may, if they so desire, leave them at the rest room for the use of the mothers. Mrs. Joseph O. Grey of North Riverside avenue is the president of the Parent-Teachers' council and she will be glad to at any time give further information and help to those interested in this work.
