JAPS BLOW UP ANOTHER FORT

They Destroy One Side of a Fortress and Kill Several Hundred Russians.

ALSO DESTROY TWENTY PIECES ARTILLERY

Bombardment in Progress When Last Reports Were Received at Tokio—Japanese Bombard and Then Attack Poutiff Hill, But Are Repulsed—Snow is Falling in the Region of Mukden—The First Division of the Baltic Fleet Going Through Suez Canal—Did Not Travel Last Night.

Reims, Nov. 26.—A dispatch to the Italia Militaire from Tokio, says the whole north side of Fort Ehrlung has been blown up by the Japanese. Several hundred Russians were killed and 20 guns rendered useless.

GOING THROUGH THE CANAL

Suez, Nov. 26.—The first division of the Russian Baltic fleet passed the night in Bitter Lake, fearing to proceed in the darkness, owing to a possibility of Japanese attack.

ARRIVED AT SUZ

Suez, Nov. 26.—Two Russian battleships arrived here today.

JAPANESE WERE REPULSED

Mukden, Nov. 26.—The Japanese made another preliminary bombardment of Poutiff hill, under cover of which they attacked, but were repulsed. Snow fell yesterday.

FIVE EXCURSIONS IN DECEMBER

Five weekly excursion trains will be run from Walla Walla to Pendleton and return during the month of December.

PENDLETON MERCHANTS INSURE THAT NUMBER

Excursion Rates Will Remain the Same Except for the Round Trip From Walla Walla—A System of Rebating Will Be Put in Operation—During December the Excursions Will Take Place on the 1st, 8th, 15th, 20th and 23d—Scheme Grows in Popularity.

This is the decision of the merchants of this city, and the O. R. & N. Co. has promised the trains, to be run on the following dates, which have been arranged by Pendleton business men:

Thursday, December 1.
Thursday, December 8.
Thursday, December 15.
Tuesday, December 20.
Friday, December 23.

The same excursion rates will prevail that have been in effect on the two former trains, except in the case of Walla Walla, from which point the return trip rate will be \$1.50 instead of \$1. Patrons of the train must pay the O. R. & N. Co. the full round trip fare, and on arriving at Pendleton, call at headquarters at the Commercial Association, where the difference will be refunded in cash. No trade requirements go with this arrangement.

This is to be an excursion train, and while the O. R. & N. Co. has declined to grant an excursion rate for future trains, Pendleton business men are determined to make an excursion rate, independent of the road, and will pay back the difference between the full fare and the excursion rate.

All that is required to get the full benefit of the cheap rate is to call at the Commercial Association paviors in this city and exhibit the return ticket, when the difference in the two fares will be refunded.

In order to prove that it is not the intention of Pendleton to secure trade that naturally belongs to Walla Walla, they have declined to give Walla Walla patrons an equal show with Umatilla county points. Hereafter, the excursion rate from Walla Walla will be \$1.50, instead of \$1, while the former excursion rates from all Umatilla county points will remain in effect. From Milton and Freewater the rate will be \$1; from Weston and Athena, 75 cents, and from Adams, 50 cents.

ADAMS MAY NOT BE GOVERNOR

Republican Supreme Court Decision Fences Him Out by a Technicality

PEABODY MAY HOLD THE OFFICE INDEFINITELY

Plots and Counter-plots Infest Every Locality in Colorado—Republicans Accuse the Democrats of a Scheme for Election Frauds All Over the State—The Democrats Charge a Conspiracy to Count in Peabody in Spite of Adams' 10,000 Majority—Naturalization Frauds Charged.

The supreme court today modified its previous order restraining the election commission from issuing certificates of election including presidential electors and congressmen.

WHOLESALE FRAUD CHARGED

Denver, Nov. 26.—Republicans now charge that democratic fixers from Denver are alleged to have operated in all parts of the state in the interest of Adams. It is claimed by democrats that this is intended to work up a sentiment in favor of Peabody and is preliminary to an attempt to count him in.

Contents are framed by republicans against democratic senators in Pueblo and Boulder counties. The republicans charge naturalization and other frauds.

ENJOINED FROM ATTENDING CHURCH

Walla Walla, Nov. 26.—Superior Judge Thomas H. Brents has sustained a peculiar injunction suit wherein certain former members of the Free Evangelical Lutheran Congregational church are prohibited from entering the church for the purpose of controlling in any manner the deliberations of the congregation.
