A Circular is Found in the Young Man's Room Which Explains the Author is the Agent of the Party for the Downfall of Present Government.

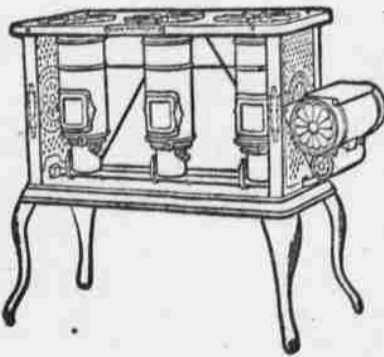
NEW YORK, July 15.—An alleged attempt to finance a filibustering expedition with the ultimate purpose of overthrowing the "superior" government of the Minas Geraes, one of the federal states of Brazil, led last night to the arrest of a young man, who, according to the complaint, has introduced himself to prominent bankers and brokers here as Sebastine H. L. de Magali, a Brazilian. De Magali is charged with violation of the United States postal law. The identity of the complaint is withheld.

and we hope we will not lack a friend at court which you have been in the past. Again, I welcome you, I take pleasure in introducing the pride of Oregon, Senator Charles W. Fulton."

It was several minutes before Senator Fulton could make himself heard so great was the applause.

Senator Fulton, when the applause subsided, said:

"In justice to you, my prior attempt to take your time, will be shortened. You come here today to hear a gentleman who holds the second position in the greatest nation on earth (great applause). The people of the United States regardless of politics recognize Mr. Fairbanks as a great statesman of today and I take pleasure in introducing Vice-President Fairbanks."

It was several minutes before the Vice-President could commence his remarks. He was bowing his acknowledgments of the ovation tendered him which was something to be proud of. He said:

"Ladies and Gentlemen: Your good natured, genial and cultured gentleman whom you have made United States Senator (applause) has made many kind references to me which I think are far too flattering. I refer to Senator Charles W. Fulton (loud and continued applause). I know that you like him. We all did at Washington (applause). Now I will tell you a story of Senator Fulton when he was in Indiana, my own state, he said that the ladies of Indiana were fine looking ladies but he said, mind his loyalty, 'Wait until you see the Astoria ladies', and now today I see the Astoria ladies and I think that Senator Fulton is right (loud applause). I was born in Indiana, not by choice, but was in Astoria and Oregon 30 years ago and am sorry that I am not now a resident of Oregon (loud applause). Many thousands today have their eyes cast on Oregon, the pride of the great Northwest and see that this is the new territory that will enhance the commercial interests of our glorious nation."

At this point Mr. Fairbanks was interrupted by the Vice Presidential salute fired from the Charleston.

"I am gratified to meet you and to be introduced by such influential men as your worthy citizens. United States Senator Fulton whom I regard as one of the wisest statesmen in Congress (great applause) and your worthy city executive, Mayor Wise (applause) and would say that these men are something good to look at (laughter). I will tell you a story of Senator Fulton that you have probably never heard. Senator Fulton told me this himself so it must be true. While traveling in California with a certain distinguished gentleman he, regardless of the ladies of Astoria, spoke of the beautiful ladies of California and now being in Astoria, and seeing the beautiful ladies around me I wonder at the disloyalty of your popular Senator and take this opportunity of correcting him in his home city (loud and continued applause). I am speaking from experience. Senator Fulton said: 'Why do not some of you ladies come to Oregon, and particularly Astoria?' Astorians are noted for their loyalty to their home city and I cannot but admire Senator Fulton's pressing invitation though I candidly say that I do not admire his taste as between the California and Oregon ladies. I have noticed the high standard of beauty and grace of the ladies of Astoria as I have seen them and will say that I did not come to meet statesman but after what Senator Fulton has told me I came to see the ladies (applause). As your worthy Mayor aptly said your city is on the fairbanks of the Columbia but I will have something on him tonight as we will not then be on the fair or any other banks of the Columbia. We will be by the 'Seaside.' I am gratified by the overwhelming hospitality of this community and will carry with me a pleasant memory of my visit to the Athens of the Pacific. I happen to know something of the early history of Astoria. When two flags floated over its boundaries; that of Great Britain and our beloved country, but now thanks be to him one flag and that our flag is the only emblem that has a rightful place in this your beautiful city (great applause)."

At this point in the spirit of the moment Senator Fulton handed Mr. Fairbanks a glass of water. "Now, ladies and gentlemen, Senator Fulton knew that I would drink that. It is not a Fairbanks cocktail (laughter). It's water. I meet here representative men of your state and states go to make a nation, and our nation is something we are all proud of. Every state is represented in our government. We are a cosmopolitan people and the best people of our states are our representatives. We use our best endeavors to build up our communities and nation. We do not look with envious eyes on the achievements of our sister states but congratulate them on their achievements in the arts and cultivation. It is not merely a commencement but a development. It is only a proof of what the country enjoys. No nation on earth accomplishes more through its young

people. Why? because our illimitable natura resources suits the tastes of all. THREE—FAIRBANKS ... If any one doubts your wonderful resources let them take a jump over the Rockies and consult your Mayor and Chamber of Commerce and then breathe the air of this salubrious climate and they will receive an inspiration that will show them the fine opportunities you present (applause). You may talk of fish stories, and my state of Indiana has some good fish stories but I wish to state here that you catch more fish in your beautiful Columbia River in one year than we have caught in all Indiana since we became a state. I admire your churches and school houses and say that the latter are your foundation of the future (applause). Build your schools and teach your youth to know our God and our country and we will be happy and prosperous (applause). Build the commonwealths of our nation and show to the world what are the highest ideals of our people. I am coming to Oregon and to Astoria again. I know not when, but just as soon as I can possibly do so and hope to find that you have continued your present prosperity and that I will find you even a more prosperous city which I believe I will. Our republic will be made strong by our citizens using the elective franchise. Not used in prejudice, nor mere whims, but according to the dictates of general judgment. Many think that there is no responsibility on them to go to the polls. They place a low and mean estimate on the honor of American citizens. I think him a traitor who will not go to the polls and cast a ballot according to the dictates of his highest ideas of citizenship. Oregon has sent men to Washington. Some have not done her honor and some have (applause). You want more stars in the flag and you should not be satisfied with less potential factors in the flag which you can insist on by standing for Oregon.

"I wish to thank you for your courtesy to me and I will always carry with me a pleasant remembrance of my visit to the western Athens of the sea."

Senator Fulton was a happy master of ceremonies and in his jovial manner kept the audience in good humor. Calls were made for many distinguished men on the platform and in response Governor Chamberlain, Congressman Ellis, Hon. Geo. H. Williams, Hon. H. M. Calk, and others responded. After these speeches the audience dispersed with three cheers for Vice-President Fairbanks.

At 7 p. m. the party took the train at the depot and without stops the train ran through to Seaside. At that city the party was met by the militia-men now in camp there, with their band and the party was escorted to the Hotel Moore. Vice-President Fairbanks spoke from the balcony and was loudly applauded. The doors to the banquet-room were opened and soon the party were seated. The tables were arranged in the form of the letter "T" which was a fine disposition and creditable to Mr. D. J. Moore to whom the arrangements were left.

In the midst of the banquet Mrs. Rose Brock Bauer of Portland created a sensation by her beautiful rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner" the guests standing while our national song was rendered.

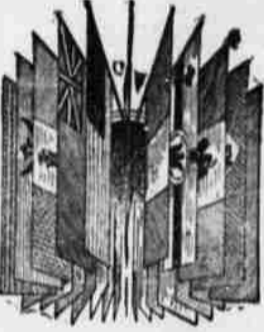

signified his willingness to testify. On Zimmer, the prosecution relied as its most important witness against Glass before the grand jury Zimmer testified that Glass drew checks for bribery money which was claimed to have been paid to the supervisors, caused Zimmer to cash them and instructed him to give the money to agent Halsey and require from Halsey no voucher, merely carrying these thousands of dollars on the current expense account.

Mayor Boxton has told the Glass jury that he as supervisor accepted \$5000 from Halsey to vote against the ordinance granting a rival franchise to the Home Company.

Zimmer claims he is availing himself of the "Constitutional right not to be made a witness against himself in refusing to answer the questions by the court.
