PEACE IN AMERICA GOD'S BLESSING, SAYS CARDINAL GIBBONS

Grieving Over Europe's Tragic Lot, He Praises Rescue of Tourists by U. S. Diplomats.

BOSTON, Sept. 24.—"After witnessing the sad scenes of devastation and destruction and the appalling loss of life which is now the tragic lot of a great part of Europe, we have reason to congratulate ourselves and to be thankful to Almighty God that our beloved country is enjoying the blessings of peace," said Cardinal Gibbons, who, with Cardinal O'Connell, returned from Naples today on the liner Canopic.

"The United States Government deserves great credit for its splendid work in facilitating the return home of so many American citizens in Europe as a result of the war.

Three of the American cardinals arrived too late to participate in the election. Cardinal Gibbons, Cardinal Bevin and myself.
