OPEN BREAK LIKELY, WASHINGTON BELIEF

By the Associated Press Washington, July 30.—No official advice regarding the reported break in relations between Turkey and Germany have reached Washington but the Government would not be surprised if Turkey has been driven to an open rupture with the Allies.

When the present Sultan came to the throne in Constantinople a few weeks ago, he was met by anti-German feeling in the city. It has been a question whether these men were in strong enough numbers to defy the British and Teutonic powers. Many officials long have resented the dominating ways of the Germans and have blamed them for the lack of food and other supplies in Constantinople.
