TRENTON BISHOP ASSUMES OFFICE

The Right Rev. Thomas J. Walsh Is Solemnly Installed

WELCOMED BY CROWD Cardinal Farley and Many Catholic Notables Present at Pontifical Mass

Trenton, July 31.—The Right Rev. Thomas J. Walsh, D. D., former rector of St. Joseph's Cathedral, Buffalo, N. Y., was installed as bishop of the Catholic diocese of Trenton at St. Mary's Cathedral at 10 o'clock this morning.

Cardinal Farley, of New York, was among the distinguished gathering of prelates who occupied seats in the sanctuary. Dozens of pastors of churches throughout the southern part of New Jersey embraced by the diocese were present, along with representatives from their parishes and many visitors from their congregations.

In extending welcome to the new bishop for the lalty of the diocese, John P. Dullard, State Librarian, of this city, referred to the achievements of the prelate in other fields, and emphasized that he would stimulate the communicants of the diocese to more fervent zeal in their religious duties and to the upbuilding of the diocese.

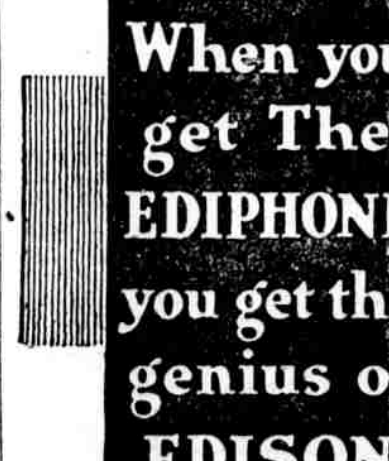
Relatives May Visit Hospitals Where Convalescing Heroes Are

TO ADOPT ZONE SYSTEM

Soldiers in the American army in France from Philadelphia and eastern Pennsylvania who are wounded are to be sent home and placed in a hospital near their own homes, where relatives and friends may visit them.

The old system of sending the returning wounded to hospitals in different parts of the United States, where they will be far from their homes, relatives and friends, and may become homesick, is to be abandoned in favor of the new plan, which will be known as the "zone hospital system."

CAMP MEADE SOLDIERS MAY WIN COMMISSIONS

Men From Each Company to Be Sent to Training Schools

CHANCE IS OPEN TO ALL

Many Transfers and Promotions Are Announced in Various Units

Camp Meade, Admiral, Md., July 31.—Soldiers who have been in training here for a short while will have the opportunity of attending the Central Officers' Training Schools now in session at several cantonments in the South.

It is understood to be the intention of the authorities to recommend at least 2 per cent of the total number of men in each company and to make the selection of the candidates from these chosen ones.

This is a part of a plan of the War Department to keep the officers' schools continuously in session instead of starting a new school in each of the camps every three months.

Under the new zone system men who were drafted from Pennsylvania will be returned when wounded to the Pennsylvania zone hospital. The same system will be applied to other States as soon as the plan can be worked out.

Five new buildings there, which are nearing completion, were offered to the War Department by the city authorities and have been formally accepted by Colonel Horsby for the surgeon general.

In these new buildings the medical corps will establish a general hospital for the treatment of men injured at the front.

The convention adopted resolutions pledging allegiance to the nation; favoring a "nonpartisan conduct of the war," and indorsing both the equal suffrage and prohibition amendments to the Federal constitution.

91. BUT WANTS SHOT AT KAISER

Marietta Veteran of Three Wars Eager to Fight

Marietta, Pa., July 31.—John B. Bastian, of this place, veteran of three wars, celebrated his ninety-first birthday here yesterday. Asked what his greatest ambition in life is just now, he answered: "To go to war again, even if I am too old. I am a retired undertaker and I would like to get a shot at the Kaiser."

Mr. Bastian came to this country in 1851, settling in Philadelphia after serving in two French wars. He served nearly four years in the Civil War. He was wounded so severely at Fort Fisher, Va., that surgeons said he could not live for twenty-four hours.

SOLDIERS' SISTERS CAN GO

War Department Modifies Ban on Workers in France

Washington, July 31.—Because the American Red Cross, the Young Men's Christian Association and other allied bodies doing war work in France are unable to obtain a sufficient number of women workers, the War Department has modified its ban on the relatives of officers and men in the American expeditionary forces.

The order provides that the sisters must be duly accredited members of one of the authorized organizations; must be particularly qualified for the work to be done; must be sent to France as workers and not as relatives; must make no effort to visit relatives in France, whether sick or well; must be returned home by the organization to which they belong.

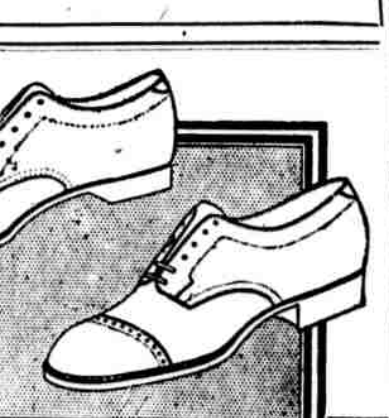
