Ouimet Needs Practice Lieutenant Ouimet is particularly anxious to play during the present winter, in view of the fact that Vernon and other English golfers have planned a trip to this country next year, and Ouimet will be expected to meet them.

Golf enthusiasts in Florida are looking forward to a meeting soon between Evans and Ouimet, who are undoubtedly among the most popular players in the country.

Marston in Form Marston and Anderson have played some excellent golf during the present year, despite the curtailed activity in the game and the fact that tournaments were practically abandoned altogether.
