

Electrical Pool Markers

Players of the seductive game of pool often find it desirable, especially on private tables, to dispense with the services of the attendant whose duty it is to mark the score. To meet such conditions an electrical register has been devised by which the progress of the game can be accurately recorded. Contact buttons are so arranged in front of the pockets that when a ball is holed it strikes the button, and the point is registered by an annunciator on the wall of the room. The same principle has been applied to a pin-ball table. Push buttons are fixed in place of pins on an ordinary pool table, and the balls passing over the buttons make a connection which is shown on the annunciator, so that when the player has finished scoring the total number of points made are automatically recorded.

THE LABOR WORLD.

The women compositors of Boston, Mass., have been organized.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., has eight carpenters' unions with about 1400 members.

Russia is rich in coal and iron, and its mines for the want of labor remain undeveloped.

The extreme heat is having a fatal effect on Hungarians working at the Pennsylvania coke ovens.

ABOUT 600 Japanese miners recently left Koba for Mexico, where they will be employed in copper mines.

NINE years ago there were only eleven State labor bureaus in this country, and now there are twenty-eight.

THERE were more strikes and demands for higher wages in May among the silk workers than in the entire year of 1911.

DELEGATES from fourteen labor organizations in Boston, Mass., recently formed a new Amalgamated Building Trades Council.

The telegraph operators in Spain have struck, and communication with the provinces is suspended. The wires are being worked by the military.

ELECTRICIANS report a more urgent demand for appliances than ever before known, and all of the well satisfied works are crowded with contracts.

The co-operative factory established by the Cigar-Makers' Union of Hamburg, Germany, employed about 100 people last year, and the surplus was \$2473.10.

ATLANTIC CITY (N. J.) waiters are proposing to establish a grade tip system ranging from a ten-cent tip at a two-dollar hotel to fifty cents at a swell hotel.

It is stated that the average wages paid machinists in shipyards is about \$10, only very few men in New York shipyards have ever received more than \$18 per week.

At Pittsburgh, Penn., the demand for finished iron is good, the prospect of wage difficulties stimulating the workers demanding last year's scale and the manufacturers a reduction.

The guards, or brakemen, on English railways are on commencing, eighty-seven cents per day, and after a time get a dollar. The drivers, or engineers, get \$1.12, and get up to \$1.35.

GLASGOW, Scotland, has an industrial home where women who have come out of prison get a home provided for them and where they are employed in laundry work, for which they receive payment.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.

SOUTH BERMAH and the East Indies intend to have a worthy exhibit at the Exposition.

Japan has applied for space in the World's Fair Mines and Mining building for a mineral exhibit.

A COLLECTIVE exhibit at the World's Fair by the various college fraternities in the United States is well assured.

The Indian exhibit at the World's Fair will include representatives of every tribe from the extreme north to Terra del Fuego.

A SOLID gold brick, weighing 500 pounds and worth \$150,000, will be exhibited in the Mines and Mining building at the World's Fair, by a Helena (Montana) mine owner.

The Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Society will exhibit at the World's Fair, among many other interesting articles, a collection of specimens of old colonial and State bank money.

The chair in which Thomas Jefferson sat while writing the Declaration of Independence is now owned by the Philosophical Society, Philadelphia. It is reported that this interesting relic will be exhibited at the World's Fair.

A SCAQUOON is now being fitted out at Halifax to go to the arctic regions to get ten or twelve Eskimo families, fifty or sixty persons in all, for exhibition at the World's Fair. Dogs, fishing implements, utensils, and everything necessary to show Eskimo life, will also be procured.

THREE World's Fair Commissioners from France are now in Chicago, to erect and decorate the building which will be the headquarters of France at the Fair, and to complete arrangements for installing the French exhibit. They say that France will have an exhibit unrivaled by that of any other Nation.

The World's Fair grounds and buildings, now nearing completion, are so renowned as a most beautiful and interesting spectacle that not only do from 5000 to 15,000 people a day, at a cost of twenty-five cents apiece, inspect them, but the great majority of travelers who pass through Chicago devote a day or more to the same purpose.

MRS. POTTER PALMER, President of the Board of Lady Managers, who has recently returned from a European tour, reports that women of Europe, particularly of Great Britain, France, Germany and Belgium, are deeply interested in the World's Fair, and are working hard to make the woman's branch of it a splendid success.

AN exhibit of bells will be made at the World's Fair by a large manufacturing concern in this country, and the firm is planning to display it in a reproduction of the Tsar Kolokol (king of bells), the famous broken bell of Moscow, which is twenty-two feet in diameter and twenty-one feet three inches high, weighs 443,772 pounds, and is used as a cannon.

It is probable that a number of genuine Astrakhan sheep, the finest specimens living, will be exported to the World's Fair. A dozen of them have recently arrived in this country from Persia, having been purchased there by United States Minister Beale for Secretary Rusk, of the Department of Agriculture, who intends to try the experiment of raising the species in this country.

Those who have been charged with the preparation of the Turkish exhibit are making very extensive preparations to have it of superior merit and interest. They will charter a large ship to transport the exhibit. They will bring over 400 native Turas arrayed in their National costumes. They will reproduce at Chicago a street in Constantinople with all its peculiar crookedness and narrowness and its interesting bazars and restaurants. The bazars will be filled with salable articles of Turkish manufacture.

KILLED FIVE CHILDREN.

The Awful Grim of a North Carolina Brute, Who May Be Lynched.

LUMBERTON, N. C., July 5.—Frank Meares, a prominent man living near this place, became enraged because his wife was ill and unable to prepare his dinner. He got a club and his wife taking her baby fled. When she went back she found her five children with their heads battered in. Two were dead and the others cannot live. Meares was arrested and a lynching party has been organized.
