

GEDDES LIFTS VOICE FOR WORLD PEACE

British Envoy Tells Virginia Students English-Speaking Peoples Must Lead

WAR SAPS NATIONS' VIGOR

Charlottesville, Va., June 2.—The English-speaking peoples of the world should be "banded together in leadership of all the nations to the era of world peace, and as a first step to the era in which the wars which even now we can recognize as futile and unnecessary are done with forever." Sir Auckland Geddes, the British Ambassador, said in an address here today at centennial exercises of the University of Virginia.

"The continuance indefinitely into the future of peace between our peoples is so obvious a necessity of our national lives," Sir Auckland said, "that I do not dream of the contingency of its rupture. What I am concerned with is something that seems to me far greater and far nobler."

Deprecating war as a sapping of the physical vigor of nations and denying that "peace will rot the vitals of a nation," the Ambassador expressed the belief "that now is the time for the English-speaking peoples, with their great and peculiar advantages, to resolve that never again will they permit this fair world to be devastated by unnecessary war if by standing firmly together they can prevent it."

"What is to hinder their co-operation to this great end?" he asked. "Nothing that I know of but ignorance of each other's ideals and aspirations and the suspicion that is the child of ignorance."

"Once again the world has passed through the furnace of war," the Ambassador continued. "Once again the horror of the battlefield, made more horrible by science, has bitten deep into the minds of the nations. Once again for a time they yearn for peace, but as ever the human mind is forgetful of horror. Already the memories of the bestialities of war grow dim and the recollections of the fellowship, the courage, the glories of the human spirit rising triumphant above the terrors of the body grow bright and brighter. Our minds are straying back to the old circular path that leads men to speak of the honor of war and then of its glory, and, just before they again know its horror, of its desirability."

"I abate no jot or tittle of what I have said in the past, but abating nothing I think it is no derogation to speak of the gross folly of war and to beg of this great university that it will see that its sons and daughters, ere they go forth to their appointed places in the higher or the subordinate leadership of their nation, know clearly what is the cost of war."

VETERANS ON SLACKER LIST

Two Wilkes-Barre Men Who Served Abroad Wronged by War Dept.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., June 2.—Two men whose names were included in the list of alleged deserters from the United States army, published here yesterday, saved their country as members of the 100th Field Artillery, the home regiment. These men are Thomas Davis, of 48 New street, Wilkes-Barre Township, and Michael Kurkina, formerly of 52 Stanley street, Asham, now a resident of Cleveland. Thomas Davis enlisted in this city on December 8, 1917, and served honorably in France until May, 1919. Kurkina was discharged on the same day. It seems that they failed to fill out the Draft Board's questionnaire after enlisting in the 100th Regiment.

Clothing Workers End Strike

New York, June 2.—(By A. P.)—Approximately 65,000 New York clothing workers today began a gradual return to work following a general strike in the industry starting last December. Thirty thousand were expected back in the shops today as the result of an agreement reached between officials of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America and the Clothing Manufacturers' Association. A formal settlement, drawn up and signed today, provided for a 15 per cent reduction in wages for all workers except cutters, who will be graded according to the class of work.

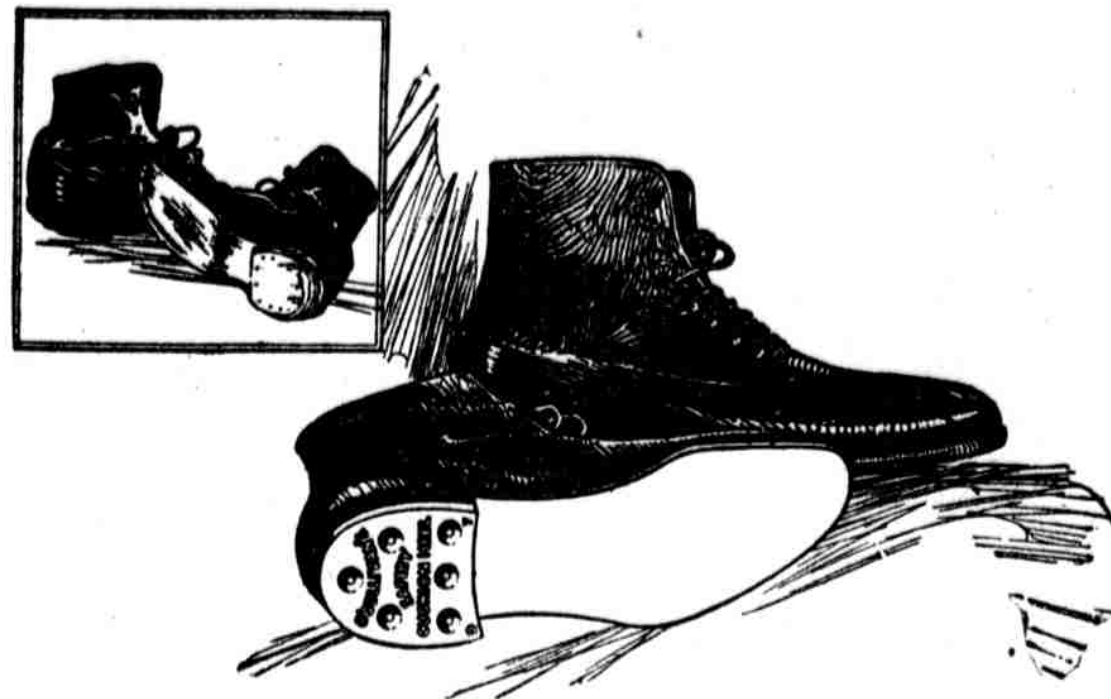
