Only One Manicurist at "Correction" in 1920

Six hundred and twenty-seven girls and women served sentences last year at the House of Correction at Holmesburg. These included 479 housewives and domestics, forty-five laundresses, twenty-six waitresses, seventeen cooks, thirteen seamstresses, seven dressmakers, six mill workers, five actresses, three stenographers, three telephone operators, three nurses, two cigarmakers, two lace workers, one buttonhole maker, one clock glazer, one hairdresser, one clock maker, one bookkeeper, one box maker, one tailor, one weaver, one manicurist.

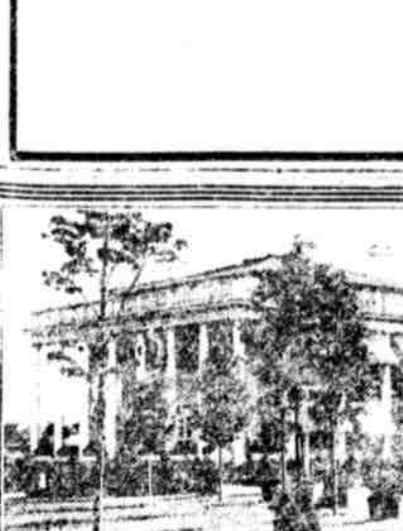

Green, who was charged with attacking six-year-old Francis Kelly, of Garrett Hill, last December, was released in \$1000 bail pending argument on motions for parole and a new trial. Mrs. J. S. C.
