INDUSTRIAL TOPICS.

The colliers of the Lehigh Valley system suspended operations yesterday for the balance of the week.

The Lehigh Coal and Navigation company's colliers in Carbon county have been closed since Monday evening for want of cars.

It is understood that the net earnings of the Wilkes-Barre and Eastern railroad since Oct. 1 will probably exceed \$50,000, considerably in excess of its fixed charges.

General Superintendent Miller, of the Pennsylvania lines, in an interview at Indianapolis, said a two-cent passenger rate is inevitable, and when it comes it will be permanent.

The Central Railroad company has adopted a new lantern frame to be used for red lights. It is known as the Luby standard copper frame.

Frederick H. Horlacher, of Mauch Chunk, expects to get a fortune out of a coal strike that has accumulated on his property at Wesoport, Carbon county, having been washed down by the Lehigh river from the mines.

Miners in the Schuylkill region are incensed over an expected notice of the Reading Coal company that 25 cents a month will be added to the amount deducted each month as payment to the beneficial fund, and that 2 cents will be taken from the coal tax.

The officials at some of the collieries near Hazleton are making preparations to load their cars with coal, at 20c, at the collieries chutes at the mine.
