City Ordinances.

AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1875.
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Columbia, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same, That a tax to cover the period from the first day of January, A. D. 1875, to the first day of January, A. D. 1876, for the sums and in the manner hereinafter mentioned, shall be levied, collected and paid into the Treasury of said city for the use and service thereof; that is to say:

SECTION 1. A tax of 80c on every hundred dollars in value of all real estate and personal property of every description, owned and used in the city of Columbia at any time during the said fiscal year, shall be levied and paid into the City Treasury for the use of the said city: *Provided, however,* That no personal property not taxed or liable to be taxed by the State, shall be taxed for the service of the said city.

SEC. 2. In addition to the foregoing taxes, a special tax of \$1.00 on every hundred dollars of the assessed value of all real and personal property of every description, owned and used in the city of Columbia at any time during the said fiscal year, shall be levied and paid into the City Treasury, to be used for the purpose of paying the interest upon the public debt of said city, as provided by Act of the General Assembly, entitled "An Act to authorize the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Columbia to issue bonds, and to negotiate and sell the same," approved March 13, 1872: *Provided, however,* That no personal property not taxed, or liable to be taxed by the State of South Carolina, shall be taxed for the use of said city.

SEC. 3. There shall be paid on vehicles the following tax, viz: Upon each four-wheel pleasure carriage or barouche, drawn by two or more horses, \$20; upon carriage, buggy, barouche, gig or sulky, (not used for hire,) drawn by one horse or mule, \$10; *Provided,* That the value of pleasure carriages and other pleasure vehicles specifically taxed, be not required to be returned for taxation as personal property. Upon each vehicle used for the breaking or exhibiting of horses or mules \$25; upon each express company's wagon, drawn by one horse, \$10; drawn by two or more horses, \$20: *Provided,* That nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to wagons, carts or other vehicles going to or from market, and owned by non-residents of said city, or of wagons exclusively used for agricultural purposes.

SEC. 4. That each and every person between the ages of 21 years and 45 years, liable to work on the streets of said city, may and shall be excused from the performance of such duty on the payment of \$2 to the City Clerk and Treasurer; and, on failure to pay the said sum of \$5, at the time of the payment of their city taxes, they shall, when summoned so to do, be required to work personally upon the streets of the said city for six days, under the direction of the Superintendent of the Streets, or any other person appointed by the Mayor and Aldermen to take charge of and direct them. Any person refusing or neglecting to obey such summons shall be fined \$2 for each day's neglect of the same, to be recovered by information before the Mayor and Aldermen in Council assembled. And it shall be the duty of the City Clerk and Treasurer, and of the Chief of Police, to report to the said Mayor and Aldermen all defaulters under this section.

SEC. 5. That each and every owner or tenant, or occupant of any real estate, upon any street where water is brought by pipes or otherwise from the city reservoir, shall pay to the City Treasury, at the same time with the other taxes imposed by this ordinance, a general tax of \$1 for each fifty feet of frontage where there are buildings, and one cent per foot of frontage where there are no buildings upon lots so taxed: *Provided,* That every lot upon such streets upon which any such structure or structures exist, shall pay a water tax of not less than \$1: *And provided further,* That no property holder or tenant shall be charged for more than one frontage for property owned or occupied by him. Any owner, or his agent, or occupant of any real estate, upon whose premises water is brought from the city reservoir, shall pay such sums for the use of water as may be assessed by the City Council; and an owner, or his agent, or occupant, failing to make a report of the hydrant or hydrants used by him or her, or by any tenant or occupant on such premises, shall be liable to a fine at the discretion of the Mayor.

SEC. 6. All persons who shall enclose any streets or parts of streets in the city of Columbia, by and with consent of the Council, shall pay an annual rent of \$5 on any street, or part of any street, so enclosed, or such other price or sum as may be fixed and determined by the Council; but each street, or part of street, so enclosed by the consent of Council, may at any time be opened by the order of said Council, anything to the contrary herein notwithstanding.

SEC. 7. That if any person or persons shall fail, neglect or refuse to make a return or returns to the City Assessor, on oath, of his, her or their taxable property, on or before the 31st day of January, 1875, (except as in this ordinance otherwise provided,) such person or persons shall be assessed by the City Assessor for and on all his, her or their taxable property, or other things taxed by this ordinance, according to the best information he can obtain of the value of such taxable property or other things; and such person or persons who shall fail, neglect or refuse to make a return or returns as aforesaid, or pay the tax thereon on or before the 15th of February next, shall be subject to, and pay, in addition to said tax, 10 per cent. thereon. And the said Clerk and Assessor is hereby required to assess, collect and receive the taxes and dues levied and imposed by this ordinance, and all arrears of former taxes or dues, and make a return thereof, as well as a return of all persons who shall fail to make a return and pay the taxes herein and hereby imposed, on the 1st day of May next, or as soon thereafter as may be practicable.

SEC. 8. The said Assessor is hereby directed, in assessing for taxation the amount of sales likely to be made by any dealer during the year 1875, to assume, if, in his discretion, it would be just so to do, as a basis of his estimate, the amount of such sales during the year 1874, according to the sworn returns thereof of the said dealers.

SEC. 9. That all returns of property, of every description, and of all other things made by taxation a source of revenue to the said city by this ordinance, shall be made upon the oath of the tax-payer, which returns shall be made by filling out blank forms, to be furnished on application by the said Clerk and Treasurer, on or before the 31st day of January, 1875, except as in this ordinance otherwise provided; but that time may be extended by the Mayor and Aldermen; and the said returns shall embrace every subject or object of taxation, whether held by, or pertaining to, the tax-payer, in his own right or in a fiduciary capacity.

SEC. 10. That all persons who may commence a permanent business in the city of Columbia subsequent to the time fixed for making tax returns, paying the city taxes and procuring annual licenses, shall, after the lapse of one month from opening business, make returns to the City Clerk of the value of the stock and other property employed therein, and pay their taxes and licenses; the taxes on the value of the said stock and other property to be charged for the full fiscal year, but the licenses to be paid in proportion to the remainder of the said year: *Provided, however,* That all transient dealers shall pay their full annual licenses to the close thereof.

SEC. 11. That it shall be, and it is hereby declared to be, the duty of the City Assessor to assess all the property named in this ordinance for city taxation at a reasonable valuation, and the City Clerk and Treasurer to collect the taxes levied thereon, and the per cent. imposed upon all other things as sources from which a city revenue by this ordinance is directed or contemplated to be raised, although not specifically mentioned, according to the rates herein declared: *Provided, however,* That every tax-payer shall have the right of appeal to the Mayor and to the Committee of Ways and Means for the assessment of the City Assessor for a revision thereof, in case he should thereby feel himself aggrieved.

SEC. 12. That in case it should become necessary to issue an execution against the property of the defaulting tax-payer, and to sell thereunder his real property, in order to collect the taxes due by him, it shall be the duty of the Mayor, and he is hereby empowered so to do, in order to put the purchaser thereof into immediate possession, to issue his warrant of ejectment against the owner, or against his lessee or lessees, or against any other person or persons who may be in possession thereof, and to place the said warrant in the hands of the Chief of Police, or any other officer whom he shall select, who shall proceed without delay to execute the same, at the expense and costs of the party or parties in default: *Provided,* That the owner of the fee, his lessee or lessees, shall not be deprived of the use and possession for a longer period than two years from the day of sale.

SEC. 13. That the Mayor and Aldermen shall issue execution against each and every person or corporation who shall be reported by the City Clerk and Treasurer to have failed, neglected or refused to make returns or pay the taxes imposed by this ordinance within the time herein prescribed; and all executions issued by the said Mayor and Aldermen shall have attached thereto the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk and Treasurer and the seal of the city of Columbia, in the name of which such executions shall be entitled.

SEC. 14. That all executions which may be issued to enforce the payment of taxes, fines and licenses by the said Mayor and Aldermen, in conformity with the foregoing section, shall be lodged in the first instance in the office of the Sheriff of Richland County, and may be directed to the said Sheriff or to the Chief of Police, or other persons appointed by the said Mayor and Aldermen, to collect and receive the same with the costs.

SEC. 15. That the words "real property" and "real estate," as used in this ordinance, shall be co-extensive in meaning with lands, tenements and hereditaments; the words "personal property," as herein used, includes money, goods, chattels, things in action and evidences of debt; and the word "property" includes property, real and personal.

AN ORDINANCE TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JANUARY 1, 1875.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Columbia, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same: **SECTION 1.** That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated for the payment of the various officers and other expenses of the city government for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 1875, and ending December 31, 1876, that is to say:

FOR SALARIES.—SEC. 2. For the Mayor, \$1,500; for the City Clerk, Treasurer and Assessor, \$1,200; for the City Physician, \$1,000; for the Superintendent of Streets, \$600; for the Clerk of the Market, \$600; for the Messenger of Council, \$120; street hands, \$5,580; City Attorney, \$1,000.

FOR POLICE DEPARTMENT.—SEC. 3. For Chief of Police, \$1,000; for two Sergeants of Police, \$1,200; for sixteen patrolmen, at \$480 per annum each, \$7,680.

SEC. 4.—For Alms House, Hospital and Indigent poor, \$4,500.

SEC. 5. For support of Fire Department, \$1,400.

SEC. 6. For deficiencies in appropriation to water works contract \$4,000.

FOR WATER WORKS CONTRACT.—SEC. 7. That the amount collected from water rents, and from water-frontage tax, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated for the payment towards the contract with the Columbia Water Power Company.

SEC. 8. For payment of contract for lighting streets, \$3,000.

SEC. 9. For payment of two watchmen on Bell Tower, \$340.

FOR MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES.—SEC. 10. For making and repairing streets, \$2,000; for support of Sydney Park, \$250; for printing, advertising and stationery, \$800; contingent expenses, \$700. *Provided,* That no bills shall be paid from the contingent fund until approved by the the Committee of Ways and Means.

FOR INTEREST.—SEC. 11. That the entire amount collected from the special tax of \$1.00 on the hundred dollars taxable property in the city be, and the same is hereby, appropriated to pay interest upon the bonded debt of the city.

SEC. 13. That the City Treasurer be empowered to receive coupons and passed accounts for unpaid taxes for 1873-74, except water taxes and special interest. *Provided, however,* That coupons are receivable for the latter tax.

FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE CURRENT EXPENSES OF THE YEAR 1875.—SEC. 12. The entire amount collected from a tax of 80c. on the hundred dollars taxable property in the city be, and the same is hereby, appropriated to pay expenses for the current year 1874 and 1875, commencing 1st April, 1874.

RECAPITULATION.—For salaries, \$11,600; for police department, \$9,880; for alms house and hospital, \$4,500; for fire department, \$1,400; for deficiency in water contract, \$4,000; for lighting streets, \$3,000; for watchmen on bell tower, \$340; for miscellaneous and contingent expenses, \$3,750. Total, 38,970.

The small per centage of potash which was found in analysis adds to its value. From all the experiments which I have made of the Guanahani Guano no doubt can exist that it is a valuable manure."
Prof. H. O. White, of the Georgia State Agricultural Society, says: "As shown by the analysis, this Guano contains, in good proportion, all the elements which are generally considered as of value for plant food, and the forms and combinations in which they are present are such as to render them available to and assimilable by the plant. I should judge that the proper use of this article for purposes of fertilization would be attended with great profit."
Prof. Charles U. Shepard, Jr., in a recent analysis of this Guano, says: "This Guano (of animal origin) would appear from its physical and chemical properties to answer every reasonable expectation of a commercial manure."
