#### THE PEPPERS.

An Opinion on the White, the Black and the Sanny Cayenne.

The so called white pepper is an abomination. Give me the old fashioned black pepper of our grandfathers. It has both flavor and odor and is most appetizing, while the white is nauseating. For red snuff and give me cayenne. None of your paprika! Did you ever sit pepper in your soup and notice its peculiar behavior? The black kind concentrates, all the particles rushing to a common center. The red scatters, as if each grain were at enmity with every other. Try the experiment. It means probably that black pepper is astringent, while red is laxative. The people of the tropics consume large quantities of cayenne and are not accustomed to dyspepsia. I never heard of one suffering from impaired or imperfect digestion.

Let us approach these things understandingly. The medical term for black pepper is "piper," and this same piper is recommended as a stomachic. A stomachic is a stimulant for the stomach. Red, or cayenne, pepper is "capsicum" and is an irritant as well as a stomachic. If a person afflicted with cholera morbus takes thirty drops of the tincture of capsicum in water the entire alimentary tract will immediately be congested, which should prove that red pepper is not a laxative. And this looks like a contradiction.--New York Press.

#### THE SMOKER'S PARADISE.

A Continual Use of Tobacco in the East.

Holland is the smoker's paradise. Not only is the climate one which almost compels indulgence in tobacco, but the fassant leaf may be had in abundance and at small cost. The humidity of the climate leads naturally to continual smoking, and so common is the habit that instead of measuring distances by miles it is customary for the boatmen to declare a piece to be as many pipes distant.

On entering the house of a friend a chair is offered you, the host sees that you are kept well supplied during your visit, and a fresh chair upon leaving is as necessary as a hat. Old friends are not permitted to depart until their pipes have been refilled, and the necessity for this becomes apparent when it is known that a smoker usually lights his fresh pipe from the stump of the previous one, keeping one in his mouth continually.

Pipe smokers are equally devoted to their habit, taking their pipe to bed with them and only laying it down when they become sleepy. Should they awake during the night they indulge in a short smoke before going to sleep again, and they always light their pipes before getting out of bed in the morning.--New York Herald.

#### MONDAY AS WASH DAY.

It May Be a Luxury to Us From the Dayflower Pilgrims.

Did you wonder how it came about that in our country all families think they must do their washing on Monday?

The Mayflower drifted into Massachusetts bay and lay at anchor outside in a little sheltered cove. The fathers had gone ashore to see if there was a place suitable for landing. The morning was Monday, and it seemed that the old fashioned desire to tidy up came over the hearts of the good house-keeping women of the little band.

The women were rowed to shore, and in the cold, salty water of the bay this Monday in November, 1620, the first laundresses in America washed and scrubbed in the good English fashion. Fires were built, water heated and clothes spread out on the trees and snow. When all was finished to the satisfaction of the women they signed with pleasure and said, "cleanliness is skin to goodness."

Do you know this is history? Yes, it is. Though not as dry as history sometimes is. Anything is history that shows the spirit of the times, and this wash day in America showed the spirit of the first arrivals.--Boston Globe.

#### CHOCTAW PUNISHMENTS.

The Lash Is Used on Indians Guilty of Misdemeanors.

"While in the Choctaw Nation," said a traveling man to a Houston Post reporter, "I saw a sight that impressed me much. As everybody knows, the Indians have long maintained their tribal courts and enforced their own laws, but congress several years ago denied them jurisdiction over felony cases and since that time they have administered the law only in misdemeanor cases.

"I arrived in Englewood, a little town away off the railway in the neighborhood of the Arkansas line, and almost instantly I realized that something out of the ordinary was going on, for the place seemed to swarm with twenty Indians. Upon inquiry I was informed that it was sentence day and that the Indian court would deal with malefactors. First one Indian after another was brought before the Indian judge, who conducted the proceedings in Choctaw, and as fast as one prisoner was convicted the constable or sheriff, as the case might be, would take him out and inflict the punishment.

"In all misdemeanor cases they whip--that is, a person convicted of a certain offense receives so many lashes. They would take the prisoner to a big oak tree, into the body of which had been driven an iron pin curved at the end about two feet above the average man's head, and, after tying his hands together and stripping the prisoner to the waist, he would be stretched along the tree in an upright position, and then the Indian officer would take his great rawhide strap, soaked and prepared for the purpose, and apply it with intense vigor on the back of the unfortunate.

"These blows were dealt only from the elbow, but the force used was amply evidenced by the twisting, squinting contortions of the victim. While the blood did not come, great red welts were plentiful, and the pain was fully manifested, but not in one single instance did I note an outcry. The guilty, with traditional stoicism, took their punishment, but never was there an outcry. All about the tree were gathered the friends and spectators, and the manner in which they gazed the unfortunate was a caution. They had absolutely no mercy, and I was informed that the tongue lashings accompanying the ordeal were regarded as being tenfold worse than the actual infliction of the blows.

"It used to be the case that the Indian courts, or, to speak with greater accuracy, the tribal courts, had power to inflict capital punishment, and it was only just before the present century opened that such was denied them by congress."

#### Aliens in England Long Ago.

England, except for the remote days when King John found it profitable to pull out the teeth of wealthy Jews, has troubled herself little about the alien. She did, however, get tremendously excited in the time of James I. of England over the question whether the enterprising spirits he brought with him from Scotland should be admitted to the privileges of English citizenship. The matter was the subject of solemn trial, and a sort of compromise was evolved. All those born before the union of the crowns were held to be aliens, and all those born afterward were to be natives and citizens. It was also decided that a child born abroad whose father or grandfather on the father's side was a British subject might claim a similar privilege. He could not, however, successfully claim if his father at the time of his birth was in war against this country. In the 1745 rebellion several Jacobites found this provision useful, for being regarded as aliens, they found themselves treated leniently as prisoners of war.--London Chronicle.
