



### SOME OF THE NEW LAWS

THESE HAVE BEEN APPROVED BY THE GOVERNOR.

The Most Important Given—Worth Studying and Keeping for Future Reference.

An Act to fix a maximum for selling leaf tobacco upon the floor of tobacco warehouses in this State.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That the charges and expenses of handling and selling leaf tobacco upon the floor of tobacco warehouses in this State shall not exceed the following schedule of prices, to wit: For auction fees, fifteen (15) cents on all piles of one hundred pounds and less than two hundred pounds; fifty (50) cents per pile for piles of two hundred pounds or over. For weighing and handling ten (10) cents per pile for all piles of less than one hundred pounds; for all piles of over one hundred pounds at the rate of ten (10) cents per hundred pounds; for commission on the gross sales of leaf tobacco in said warehouses, not to exceed two and one half per centum.

Section 2. That the proprietor of each and every warehouse shall render to each seller of tobacco at his warehouse a bill plainly stating the amount charged for weighing and handling, the amounts charged for auction fees, and the commission charged on such sale; and it shall be unlawful for any other charges or fees exceeding those herein named to be made or accepted: Provided, that the provisions of this Act shall not apply to the counties of Horry, Sum or, Pickens and Chesterfield.

Section 3. That for each and every violation of the provisions of this Act a penalty of ten dollars shall be enforced, and the same may be recovered by any person so offended.

Section 4. That this Act shall go into effect immediately upon its approval.

Approved the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1899.

An Act to limit the lien of the State for uncollected taxes.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That from and after the passage of this Act all taxes hereafter levied or becoming due under the laws of this State shall be conclusively presumed paid after ten years from the last date said taxes could have been paid without penalty: Provided, that this Act shall not apply to taxes for the collection of which the State shall introduce judicial proceedings within the time limited above: Provided further, that the State may bring suit in Court for back taxes any time within ten years from the date when they should be paid, whether they are on

or off the tax books, and may bring suit in Court for any taxes which should have been paid before March 31, 1899, at any time within ten years after the passage of this Act, whether on or off the tax books; and on collection of such taxes they shall be distributed to the State, counties and school districts to which they would have gone if they had been paid at the time fixed by the Act which levied the same: Provided further, that except as to the conclusive presumption after ten years of payment of taxes by taxpayer, as herein provided, this Act shall in no way affect or impair the operation of any Act entitled "An act to define the rights of the sinking fund commission as to unpaid tax claims and forfeited and other lands in the control of said commission, and for the management of the same and the disposition of other assets," approved February 18, 1898.

Approved the 28th day of February, A. D. 1899.

An Act to declare the law in relation to termination of rental contracts;

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That from and after the passage of this Act, should any tenant for years or lesser period remove from any demised premises before the expiration of the term for which said premises were demised, leased or rented, then and in such case the rent which would be earned up to the end of the month in which the tenant leaves shall be immediately due and payable, and it shall be lawful for the landlord at any time within five days after the removal of such tenant to issue his distress warrant for such an amount as may be due up to the expiration of the month in which the tenant leaves the premises.

Approved the 15th day of February, A. D. 1899.

An Act to amend Article II of Chapter LI of the Revised Statutes of South Carolina, in relation to the manner of acquiring rights of way.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, Amend Section 1, 744, by inserting after the word "compensation," in line 3, the words, "or shall remain silent in reference thereto," so that the said section, when so amended, shall read as follows;

Section 1,744 (1,551.) If the owner of said lands shall signify his refusal of consent to entry thereon without previous compensation, or shall remain silent in reference thereto, the person or corporation requiring such rights of way shall apply, by petition, to the Judge of the circuit wherein such lands are situated,

for the empanelling of a jury to ascertain the amount which shall be paid as just compensation for the right of way required, in which petition shall be set forth a description of the lands, the names of the owner, the purposes for which the lands are required, and such other facts as may be deemed material. On the hearing of such petition the Circuit Judge shall order the same to be filed in the office of the clerk of the Court of Common Pleas for said county, and shall further order the said clerk to empanel a jury of twelve to ascertain the compensation for the use of the lands required. The clerk, immediately on receiving such order, must give to the owner of the lands notice thereof, in writing, and of the day which shall be assigned. On the day assigned the clerk, in the presence of the parties, if they shall attend, shall select the names of twenty-four disinterested freeholders of the county, and shall draw therefrom the names of twelve to act as jurors, and shall cause those so drawn to be forthwith summoned to meet, at such place and at such time as he may assign, for the purpose of examining the said lands and ascertaining the compensation to be made for the right of way over the same. It shall further be the duty of said clerk, in person or by his deputy to attend at the same time and place for the purpose of organizing the jury; and he shall have the power to summon from the vicinage other disinterested freeholders to act as jurors in the stead of any of those first summoned who shall fail to attend or who shall be objected to by either party on the grounds of disqualification on account of interest.

Approved the 6th day of March, A. D. 1899.

An Act to further establish and declare the law of distress for rent.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That in all cases where property distrained for arrears of rent is subject to the lien of a mortgage placed upon said property before the rent contract was entered upon or before said property was brought upon the rented premises, the landlord shall have the right to pay the amount due upon such mortgage debt and subject said property to the payment of the same, as well as to the payment of the amount due for rent.

Approved the 27th day of February, A. D. 1899.

FREE LECTURES FOR FARMERS.

Institutes to be held this summer, under the auspices of the Clemson Faculty.

Farmers' institutes will be held in a limited number of counties this summer for the instruction of the people in various branches of agricultural science. The course of lectures shall be arranged to present to those in attendance the results of the most recent investigations in theoretical and practical agriculture, and as far as possible to make the subjects discussed meet the special needs of the locality where the institute is held.

All expenses of the meeting will be met by the college. The community in which the institute is held is expected to provide a suitable place for the speaking, to advertise the meeting and to arrange the minor details. It is desirable that local speakers and writers assist in the exercises of the institutes by discussing subjects in which they are most interested, or in which they have had successful experience.

It may not be practicable always to hold the institute on the day desired by the community as different places sometimes ask for the same date. The final selection of the date must, therefore, be left to the college authorities, but the wishes of the community will be observed as far as practicable.

It is the policy of the college to lengthen, when desirable, the sessions of the institutes. We realize that the best results can not be obtained from a one day meeting. The scope and character of the work should be broadened year after year. Where sufficient interest is manifested the institute will be conducted for a longer period than a day.

This work will begin about the first of August, and applications should be sent in at once. Specify the time and place, and the names of the gentlemen who are willing to serve on the local committee.

The subjects discussed at the institutes should be adapted to local conditions. We therefore ask those interested to designate the subjects that are believed to be of the most interest to the locality.

Among the subjects that the members of the institute staff are prepared to discuss may be mentioned: Improvement of soil, grasses and legumes, horticulture, plant diseases, botany, entomology, insects and insecticides, methods of spraying, dairying, animal husbandry, farm manure, veterinary science, fertilizers, chemistry of soils, truck farming, drinking waters, road improvement, industrial education.

After the county institutes, an institute lasting one week will be held at Clemson college. Board and lodging will be furnished at cost. Distinguished lecturers from

abroad will be invited to assist in the college institute and every effort will be exerted to make this meeting pleasant and profitable.

The Auxiliary Experiment station clubs are earnestly invited to cooperate by sending delegates.

The date and programme will be duly advertised.

BRIGHTER PROSPECTS OF PEACE.

President McKinley suggests that no unnecessary or humiliating conditions be imposed upon the insurgents.

Washington, May 5.—The State department to-day received a dispatch from President Schurman, of the Philippine commission, giving the substance of the conferences with the representatives of Aguinaldo, and asking for further instructions. While the text of the dispatch is not to be made public, Secretary Hay stated that it showed a very satisfactory condition of affairs in the Philippines, and pointed to a settlement of the difficulties there. The reply of the President to Prof. Schurman's cablegram, it is understood, stated that he was very anxious to have the peace negotiations concluded at the earliest possible moment, and to this end he desired that no unnecessary or humiliating conditions should be imposed upon the insurgents. It is believed in Administration circles that as soon as Aguinaldo is convinced of the sincerity of the American Government he will agree to surrender. He will be required, however, to lay down his arms. This will be the principal condition, and until an agreement on this point is reached the negotiations will not make any progress toward a conclusion.

**SAMPSON'S SHIPS SIGHTED.**  
Will be Cleared at New York and Will Then go to Newport.

New York, May 2.—Admiral Sampson's squadron of evolution returning from its cruise in the West Indies was sighted off the Highlands at 11.19 a. m. bound in. The squadron, which is composed of the New York, Brooklyn, Indiana, Massachusetts and Texas, is expected to anchor off Thompkinsville and from there several of the vessels will go to the navy yard to be docked and cleaned.

The squadron is to remain in this harbor until the end of the month, when it is to go to Newport, R. I., and from there it will begin its summer cruise.
