S. S. CONVENTION**

**Annual Meeting Held Last Week With Rabun Creek Church—Proceedings of the Session.**

Mrs. J. S. Bennett, secretary, has kindly furnished The Advertiser with the following report of the county Sunday school association's meeting:

The thirty-first annual convention of the Laurens County Interdenominational Sunday School association was held with Rabun Creek Baptist church on Thursday and Friday of last week, being called to order at 10:20 o'clock Thursday morning by Mr. W. L. Gray, president of the convention, Rev. E. C. Watson, who is pastor of this church, conducted the devotional exercises of the morning session, by reading the 13th chapter of 1st Cor. and basing his remarks on the importance of charity, or love one for another. He closed with such beautiful words of welcome that every one present was indeed made to feel at home with such a pastor and people.

Mr. Gray responded to this warm welcome and then proceeded to deliver the annual report, which consisted of a brief review of the progress of the organization, and concluded his remarks by emphasizing the importance of using the Bible more in the Sunday school work.

The convention was very much saddened when Mr. Gray announced the fact that Mr. J. M. Way, general state secretary, would be absent on account of the death of his mother which occurred the previous day, but introduced his representative, Mr. Wallace of Pelzer, who delighted his audience with his instruction and helps in teaching the elementary department of the Sunday school.

Rev. J. H. Maehon of Colgate university led the devotional exercises of the second session. Mr. C. C. Featherstone's stirring address, "Missions in the Sunday School," and Selected Lessons from Teacher Training, by E. W. Gregg of Gaffney, caused many parents and teachers to stop and consider the tremendous importance of the correct training for missions in the Sunday schools. Mr. Gregg also used the Round Table in showing that "Specialization" is the demand of today. The last half hour was given to the reports of committees and election of officers.

The officers elected were: W. C. Wharton, president; J. A. Mahon, first vice-president; J. H. Wolff, second vice-president; Mrs. R. E. Babb, secretary-treasurer.

Much could be said of the excellent speeches made at the convention, as they were listened to by the delegates with close attention, and of the beautiful Christ-spirit and brotherly love that pervaded the whole proceedings, but suffice it to say this convention goes down as one of the best in the history of the association.

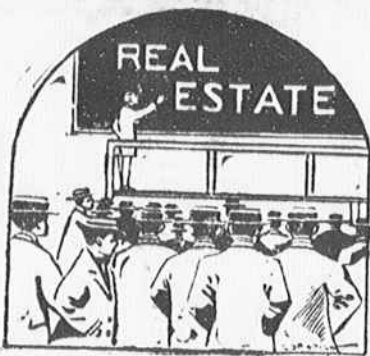

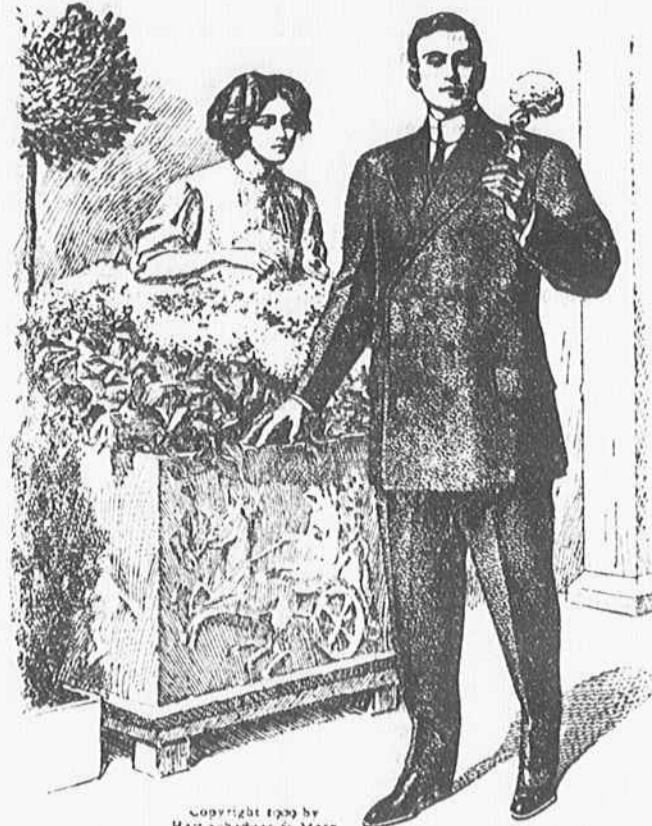
