Big Stone County Court.

Court is now in session at Ortonville. The Noonan murder trial will be the most important criminal case. In civil suits the case of Olson vs. Larcome will be most ably contested. This is a test suit to determine the right of several parties to that strip or portion of territory lying between the Minnesota river and a meander line about half of a mile west, where the river was supposed to run until recent surveys proved differently. The land is in Lac qui Parle county where action was first brought and then transferred for convenience to Big Stone county, and adjoining Big Stone City, the tract is of great value. Any decision arrived at in district court will be appealed to the Supreme court of Minnesota where the final determination will take place. The contest grows out of the fact that those persons owning the lots which, according to the old survey were supposed to extend to the river, find their claims curtailed by the intervention of new settlers on the land between the meander line and the river, the latter asserting that the lots of the early settlers extend only to the meander line and that the remainder was open for pre-emption. Geo. W. Hawes, Esq., of this city is counsel for the defense, while Judge Emmett of Ortonville, prosecutes for the contestant.
