Auto Thieves Are Getting Busy
Stour Falls, March 2.—Auto thieves made their richest haul in Stour Falls sometime early this morning when they entered the private garage of Martin Larson, 824 West Tenth street, and slipped away with his big 7-passenger Marmon. It was the third time that Mr. Larson has been robbed of a car either of the others approximately the value of the big Marmon which is worth \$5,999. Mr. Larson is credit manager for Shriver-Johnson company.

The car is described as being a last year's model with blue body, wire wheels, etc., and the serial number is 7284333. Mr. Larson is making every effort to discover some clue which might aid him in the recovery of his car, and this afternoon offered a reward of \$100 to any one giving information which might lead to the location of the car. The car is probably the most expensive of any yet taken in this city, a fact which indicates the work of skilled professionals in their line. A description of the car has been sent to surrounding towns and main thoroughfares are under observation for miles around in the hope of finding some trace of the bandits.

Coyote Seeks Refuge In Church
Green Elm, Kan., March 2.—Finding all avenues of retreat cut off by men engaged in a wolf drive here a large coyote sought the refuge of the church and was saved.

Rev. John Ennis was in the midst of an earnest appeal for Christian work and Sabbath observance when the coyote bounded through the door and up the aisle.

The startled pastor and congregation saw the frightened animal dash to a place of safety in a corner behind the organ. As the church members had bitterly opposed Sunday wolf drives, the pastor calmly suggested that the church-going coyote be given protection. The rousing ended in failure.

The coyote was left in the church all day and at dusk a deacon opened the door and the animal departed hastily.

Seaplane Makes A Fatal Dive
Pensacola, Fla., March 2.—Slipping on its left wing after doing stunts until it had run into a life float by a small boy and the string had become hooked to its tail, a seaplane piloted by Eugene J. W. Alcorn, former circus performer, swept low over a bathing beach today, and with its left wing just clearing the sands killed two negro women and injured two negro children

and another negro woman so severely that they died. Alcorn was arrested pending an investigation while the authorities began search for a man and woman who had been his passengers.

The seaplane landed on the water with a broken wing. Alcorn had planned to leave the navy and join a circus April 1.

WARNS AGAINST FOREIGN HUBBY
Mrs. Tartoue Hopes American Girls Will Profit by Her Unfortunate Experience.
WIFE OF PORTRAIT PAINTER
Says European Men Are Not Brought Up With the Ideals of Marriage and Womanhood That American Men Are.

New York.—"If American girls who are contemplating marriage with foreigners will only listen to me and take warning from my unfortunate experience with a distinguished foreigner, to whom I gave my love and devotion, I will feel repaid in a measure for the ordeal through which I have passed and the humiliation I must now endure.

"Most men from the continental European countries are not brought up with ideals of marriage and womanhood which American girls are taught to believe American men have. They make bad husbands for an American girl, and my advice to girls is to pick out an American for a husband."

That is what Mrs. Pierre Tartoue, wife of the noted portrait painter, said in discussing her marriage and her suit for separation just started.

Mr. Tartoue is said to be in the Adirondacks. His studio is said to have been subject to Rene Van Loon, a friend.

"Since Mrs. Tartoue departed from her home over a month ago in the middle of the night, following a series of alleged sensational incidents in and near the studio, she has been living in seclusion with her mother, Mrs. R. Benque Barnet.

Tells of Persecution.
Light on the nature of her disagreement with her husband was shed by Mrs. Tartoue during her interview. She said:

"The persecution to which I was subjected by two elderly women will be made public during the trial.

"I lent myself to Pierre for publicity purposes much against my own inclination. He told me it would help him.

"I lost him money as well as most American girls who marry foreigners and they are obliged to do for the sake of preserving their homes and saving their husbands from financial difficulties. My family and friends have begun to know intimate details concerning these financial transactions.

"I sacrificed myself on the altar of Pierre's art and I soon discovered he did not appreciate it. This is my attitude toward my husband. I have no animosity in my heart, only pity.

"After I was Pierre's wife he constantly told me I was no longer an American woman. He said I was under the French law, because I had married a French citizen. He told me I would have to bear half the expense of our establishment and that French women had no rights.

Helped in His Work.
"Pierre told me he was badly in love with me. I was really in love with him. He told me and told my friends I was the most beautiful American girl. He told me I was an inspiration to him in his art. Following implicitly on his and in his opinion, I helped him every way I could. I even posed for him for portraits of myself, and I posed for the hands and gloves of some of his best portraits. Among those were the portraits he painted last year of Mrs. Frederick Brooks of New York, Mrs. Harold Brooks and Miss Ruth Sheehy of Buffalo.

"After he had painted a portrait of me with my wedding veil over my head, some critic told him it was one of the best pieces of work he had ever done. When he painted the 'God of Happiness,' his point name on Long Island, I helped him with my suggestions.

"I found, however, that Pierre did not appreciate me. With my own hands I used to cook him little steaks dinner so that at the end of the day, when he was tired out from painting, he would not have to go out for dinner. These were halcyon days when Pierre had I were by our selves night after night in our studio. I could hardly believe the things were real, it was so ideal.

"We were married October 14, 1929, and I will never forget the promise he made that day, for he did not keep a single one of them."
