### THE FARMER'S WIFE

(Mary Ann Gray)

**Prevention of Colds**—This is the time of year when colds are prevalent, because of changeable weather, the wearing of lighter clothing these first damp days and the shutting of windows in the house says Mrs. Harry Perry, health nurse and teacher of hygiene at State college at Brookings.

"Exposure and chilling are often the causes of a nose cold, so the skin should be trained not to react to chilling and dampness. This is done by daily bathing, followed by a rub with a washcloth dipped in cold water, then a dry rub with a coarse towel. Heavy wraps should not be put on too early in the fall but the outing clothing should be adapted to suit the weather, and on rainy days mothers must see that the children wear rubbers, as wet feet cause many colds. Indoor workers, housewives and school children ought not to wear as heavy underwear as outdoor workers, as too much clothing weakens resisting powers. The temperature should be kept steady around 68 degrees in the house and office, if workers move around the room, but 70 degrees is usually preferred.

"Do not be afraid to let your skin breathe, and have your windows open at night so the air can circulate freely through the whole house," Mrs. Perry suggests.

But if you do get a cold, the health nurse at State college believes the emergency treatment of hot foot bath, a hot drink of flax seed tea or lemonade, an intestinal cleanser and a sweat, will usually cure the nasal infection.

"If you have a cold, remember that it is unpleasant and a drain on your system. Therefore be considerate enough not to give it to your family and neighbors," Mrs. Perry warns.

### PLENTY OF SNOW IN THE BLACK HILLS

Pierre, S. D., Nov. 8—Snow in the greater part of the Black Hills at a time when the big game hunting season is on has lessened the danger of forest fires and at the same time made better weather for hunting deer, according to those who have been in the Hills recently. The snowfall is all the way from a foot to two feet but it has been melting some and is not the most ideal for the hunters though it has given an opportunity for some tracking and has softened up the leaves, pine needles and twigs to such an extent that a hunter's movements are less noisy than in dry weather.

At present there is no way of estimating the number of hunters in the Black Hills after big game as reports are slow in coming in to the state game warden. However, it is believed that during the open season the number of licenses will about equal last year.

Deer are reported to be quite plentiful, probably more so than during the last open season on deer. This is due to the fact that there were comparatively few killed during the last season, the "buck" law being in effect and on additional refuge for the animals by the opening of the Roosevelt game preserve.

During the season of 1921 there were 179 deer killed according to the annual report of the game and fish department which will soon be off the press and ready for distribution. Practically all of the deer killed by residents of the Black Hills though there were a few bagged by the hunters from the prairie sections of the state. Rapid City led with 39 residents having made a kill, Hill City and Nemo come next with 10 each, Lead, Sucter and scenic are third with 8, Hot Springs 7 and Deadwood 6.
