PATRIOTIC PRECEDENT SET BY STOVE COMPANY

Each Employee of Hardwick Stove Company Given Thrift Stamp Card.

Cleveland, March 14.—The Hardwick Stove company, one of the most progressive organizations of the south, has established a patriotic precedent by giving to each of their employes a thrift card containing stamps, which all together aggregate several hundred dollars.

Many of the employes were already investors in war savings stamps, but now they have a 100 per cent. shop.

C. L. Hardwick, manager of the company, has purchased the limit of \$1,000 in war savings stamps, and is helping materially in the work of putting Bradley county over the top ahead of all other counties in Tennessee.

The following on a neatly printed card was enclosed with the thrift card:

"The Tuscania lies at the bottom of the ocean, a victim of German ruthlessness. With her are some of our American boys, who have given their lives that you and I might be safe here at home.

"These hundreds of lives have gone forever, and we must do something.

Cleveland Proposes to Do Her Bit in the Coming Campaign.

Cleveland, March 14.—Plans have been perfected for the thrift day rally here on March 23. All committees are busy working out details and a great day is assured.

In the forenoon there will be a band concert on the courthouse lawn from 10 to 11. In the afternoon there will be a patriotic parade with music at 2:30. Hon. Foster V. Brown, of Chattanooga, will deliver a patriotic address at the courthouse.

The parade will start promptly at 1:30, and will be assembled on Ocoee street north of the monument.

Miss Sallie Hoskins will have charge of the war savings stamp booth on the courthouse grounds, and will be assisted by Miss Ethel Owenby and Miss Mattie Sloan. Stamps will be sold and general information supplied by these ladies.

The Boy Scouts will be out in full force to sell stamps in the business section throughout the day, and the ladies of the Red Cross will serve lunches and refreshments.

HOPES OF RECEIVING GOVERNMENT AID

Dalton, Ga., March 14.—Following a visit of W. R. Neel, state highway engineer, to this city the board of commissioners has strong hopes of receiving government aid in rebuilding the Dixie highway through this county. The board has asked for an appropriation of \$15,000, and this, with \$15,000 from the county, will, in Mr. Neel's opinion, put the road in good condition.

Mr. Neel made the trip here from Atlanta by automobile. He stated that all counties between Dalton and Atlanta, with the exception of Gordon, had asked for appropriations for the Dixie highway, which, because of its recognized military value, stands a fine chance of getting appropriations when the appropriation of government highway funds is made this month.

DAMAGED FRENCH INDUSTRIES RESTORED IN FIVE YEARS

(Correspondence of Associated Press.)

Paris, Feb. 8.—The damaged industries and the upheaved and exhausted farm lands of France, it is thought now, may be restored to their full productive capacity within five years after the conclusion of peace with the exception of denuded forests and the most gravely wasted land in the immediate proximity of the line where the front has been practically stationary for more than three years.

These are some of the elements upon which they count to make up for what France will have lost. Continued and developed use of female labor in industries; entrance of youths into active business and industry at an earlier age; greater activity and consequent greater productive capacity of all categories of workers; and an enormous extension of the use of modern labor-saving equipment in the factory and on the farm.

The development of water power will contribute immensely to fill the void in industrial facilities, while five years' recruits of boys coming to age for active participation in the country's affairs is expected to replace at least a third of the wastage in human material.

PARIS SALON TO BE HELD AFTER LAPSE OF 3 YEARS

Paris, Feb. 13.—(Correspondence of Associated Press.)—The Paris salon will be held this summer after an interruption of three years. It will inaugurate an innovation, all the French art societies joining in the exhibition for the first time in many years. The Grand Palais of the Champs Elysees being still occupied as a military hospital, the Petit Palais, on the opposite side of the Avenue Alexandre, will be utilized. The collections now hung there will be temporarily stored. The exhibition will be necessarily restricted as compared with those of recent years because of the considerably reduced space available in the Petit Palais. It will probably be opened early in May.

GERMANY READY TO SEND UP NEW PEACE BALLOON

Overtures in Form of Concessions Offer Not Likely to Hoodwink France.

(Riley Gramson in Washington Post.) Germany is now ready to send up another peace balloon, in the hope of either dividing the allies or inducing them to enter into conference.

Agents of Germany are active in Switzerland and Sweden, trying to bring about a movement in neutral and allied countries looking to peace conferences. Tens of thousands of placards have been smuggled into the French lines by spies and defectors, urging peace. These placards read: "Let us demand peace! Enough of blood!" The French army has captured and summarily executed some of the distributors of these placards.

Conditions Wholly Different.

Apparently the same plan of defeatism which broke down the Italians is now being tried on the French. The conditions are wholly different and there is not the slightest danger that the French will be hoodwinked by the crude devices which deceived the ignorant south Italians. These fellows, mostly Calabrians, were not very strong in morale at any time, and their religious ignorance was preyed upon.

Between thirty and forty priests who aided the enemy in spreading the propaganda of "mutual laying down of arms" were executed. Twenty-six of Cadorna's generals were court-martialed and shot. This information is given me by an Italian officer who obtained it at the front.

Willing to Give Up Territory.

Germany's general peace overtures now are likely to take the form of an offer to make generous concessions to France and Belgium if the allies will be so good as to accept the war map as it stands elsewhere. In other words, Germany is willing to relinquish a part of the territory she has occupied and drained dry if she is permitted to retain the remainder.

In the meantime, true to form, Germany is hurrying to take over the Baltic coast, including Finland, and also to make possession of the Black sea secure, preliminary to encroachments upon Persia and Afghanistan.

A few more weeks of uninterrupted "consolidation" and Germany will not care particularly what happens during the balance of 1918. The allies may pound at her along the west, but she can shoulder off their blows. They cannot wrest the Russian western territories from her, nor can they get into the Baltic and compel her to retire from the commanding place she has acquired.

INSPECTION AT U. S. MINT FORMS BIG TASK

No Material Departures in Weight and Quality of Coins Detected in Test.

Philadelphia, March 10.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Samples of specie tested in the annual inspection of the United States mint here by the coin assay commission represented the largest number of coins ever passed upon by a body of this sort. The work was completed recently.

No material departures from the weight and quality standards of coins have ever been detected at the mint in

this city. Ten-dollar and twenty-dollar gold pieces must assay within a half grain of the required weight and five-dollar and two-and-one-half-dollar gold coins within a fourth of a grain. In silver, coins of all denominations are passed if they are within one and one-half grains of the standard.

POWERFUL OIL GUSHERS TAPPED ON ISLAND OF JAVA

Amsterdam, Feb. 2.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Advices from Sourabaya, on the island of Java, state that powerful oil gushers have been tapped at a depth of 900 yards in the Tremboel fields. Another message says that an iron vein four feet thick has been located near Mailli and the chief of the geological survey estimates the quantity of ore available at 10,000,000 tons.

To the Democrats of Hamilton County:

I am a candidate for the office of Attorney-General, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary, April 24, 1918.

I have been practicing law in the Criminal Court, and in other courts in Chattanooga, for more than twenty-four years, and have had employment on one side or the other of more than three hundred murder cases, and more than one thousand felony cases. While City Attorney I acted as prosecuting attorney in something like fifteen thousand misdemeanor cases in the City Court.

I came to Chattanooga twenty-five years ago, from the state of Georgia, and have studied hard to learn the law for all of these years, and am entirely familiar with the duties of the office of Attorney-General. I know its requirements and its high responsibilities, and have practiced in the Criminal Court until I am familiar with its rules and procedure.

I have spent the best part of my life in Chattanooga, and my life has been an open book; I have made many mistakes, but I never intentionally wronged or injured any man.

If elected I will enter this office without having made any pledges, promises or obligations to any man or set of men, except to do my duty fairly and impartially, and to guarantee to every man a square deal.

I will protect the public peace, and no man or set of men shall ever become strong enough or powerful enough to set aside the law and to trample it under their feet, without being brought to the bar of justice and having administered to them the punishment imposed by the law. I will always bear in mind that for the poor and unfortunate mercy and charity should be extended on many occasions, and I will do so wherever an occasion arises that seems to justify it.

I will try to see that every officer is paid his legitimate cost in all cases, but it sometimes happens that fee-grabbers arrest people and put them in jail for the sake of fees, and not for the purpose of enforcing the law, and these men will get no cost, but will be put out of that kind of business.

Dominated by a high purpose to give the people an honest and efficient administration of the law, I will appreciate a vote of confidence in the primary April 24, 1918.
