CAPITAL MERELY AWAITING FATE

Passive Attitude Is Assumed. Austro-German Advance Continues.

Washington, March 20.—Russian warships at Odessa escaped to Sebastopol when the Germans took Odessa, according to a dispatch to the state department today from American Consul Summers at Moscow. Recent press dispatches quoted Berlin authorities as declaring that fifteen ships were taken when the city was occupied.

London, March 20.—Occupation of Petrograd by the Germans is only a matter of hours, according to dispatches from Petrograd to several of the morning papers. The Russian capital is said to be assuming a waiting attitude and is not displaying the slightest sign of organized resistance. The Germans are reported in a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd to have reached the vicinity of Dno station, about 150 miles south of Petrograd. The Austro-German advance in southern Russia continues. The enemy has occupied Sumy, five hours' march from Khar'kov, the dispatch says.

Greatest Anxiety Shown. The various reports from Russia also indicate the greatest anxiety over what appears to be an enveloping movement of the Austro-German forces are carrying out against Moscow. There is talk of moving the government, according to these advices, to Sarajoff (probably Saratoff, 450 miles southeast of Moscow), or to Nizhni Novgorod (265 miles northeast of Moscow). A Reuter dispatch from Petrograd, dated March 19, reports the patriarch of the Russian church to have sent a message to the orthodox population declaring that the church cannot regard as binding a peace which dismembers the country and places it under the domination of a conquering foreign power. In this connection the communist is quoted as declaring that the Russian proletariat cannot make further concessions, but must be ready to rise at any moment, irrespective of its state of preparedness.

Other reports from Petrograd state that the council of people's commissioners has ordered the arrest of M. Bibenko, the commissioner of marine, for opposition to the ratification of the peace treaty. Petrograd dispatches stated on March 13 reported that M. Bibenko had been missing for several days.

Mysteriously Murdered. A Petrograd message received today carries the report that on Monday night three of the people's commissioners, names not given, entrusted with the organization of the red revolutionary navy, were mysteriously murdered.

No Surprise to America. Washington, March 20.—The continued advance of the German army into Russia despite the peace treaties signed at Brest-Litovsk is no surprise to American officials, who all along fully expected the German high command to prosecute its designs in Russia to the fullest extent, regardless of

ANNISTON MAY GET REPLACEMENT CAMP

Washington, March 20.—The importance of accurate artillery barrages in trench warfare has so impressed army heads that the war department is considering plans to establish schools of instruction for artillerymen to supplement the work of the service school at Fort Sill, Okla.

Brig. Gen. W. J. Snow, recently was appointed chief of artillery on the general staff for the purpose of reorganizing that arm to meet the increased demands. He is understood to have prepared an expansion schedule which would result in the turning over of one divisional cavalry to the construction in artillery work, and the establishment of two or three additional camps for brigade instruction. Camp McClellan, at Anniston, Ala., has been most frequently mentioned as the logical site for the artillery replacement camp.

CREATION OF FREE ZONES PROPOSED IN NEW BILL

Washington, March 20.—Creation of free zones at the various ports of the United States to encourage foreign commerce and build up a great port similar to that at Hamburg is proposed in a bill introduced by Representative Sanders, of Louisiana. The bill is understood to have administration support.

REPRESENTATIVE KITCHIN CONT'D AS TO BILL

Washington, March 20.—The house today dispensed with its usual routine business to continue work on the war finance corporation bill. Representative Kitchin, in charge of the measure, appeared confident that the house would retain the main features of the bill advocated by the administration to aid war industries and easy passage was looked for.

PORTUGUESE TROOPS REPULSE ENEMY RAIDS

London, March 20.—Raids attempted by the enemy last night in the neighborhood of Fauquissant were successfully repulsed by Portuguese troops, says today's official communication.

With the exception of some artillery activity on both sides in the Passchendaele sector there is nothing further to report.

Ready to Counter-Attack.

On the French front in France, Monday, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—In a raid into the German lines at Malincourt wood, northwest of Verdun, Sunday, French troops found the German shelters full of troops waiting to launch a counter-attack. The shelters, with all their occupants, were destroyed by bombs. A large number of German trench mortars were demolished and many machine guns were brought back by the French.

While the prisoners taken in the raid were going to the rear, the German artillery fired a large number of shells which claimed twelve victims among the captives.

Driven Off With Loss.

London, Tuesday, March 19.—German artillery is still very active in the Ypres sector, southwest of Cambrai, and in the region about Armentieres, according to the official statement from the war office tonight. The text reads: "A party of the enemy attempted to approach our lines this morning, northeast of Armentieres, but was driven off with loss. The activity of the enemy artillery against both the forward and back areas in the Ypres sector continued. There was some hostile artillery in the neighborhood of Vermelles and against a number of localities between the LaBassee canal and Armentieres."

Activity in Lorraine. Paris, Tuesday, March 19.—The artillery actions were heavy on the right bank of the Meuse in Lorraine, between Bures and Badonviller and at some points in upper Alsace," says tonight's official communication. "On the Macedonian front calm prevails."

Reconquer All Posts.

Paris, Tuesday, March 19.—Following is the official Belgian communication of today: "All the advanced elements of our trenches where the Germans gained a footing yesterday in the region of Nieuport, have been reconquered by us. The enemy is now without any part of the positions which he intruded. After preparations on a large scale the enemy attempted to seize advanced posts near Beverdyk, but our barrage fire defeated his effort. Numerous bodies of Germans were found in the trenches which were occupied."

Six hundred bombs were dropped during the night on two airfields used by enemy night flying machines and on ammunition dumps and billets. All our machines returned."

MARTIAL LAW DECLARED BY UKRAINIAN COUNCIL

London, March 20.—The Ukrainian national council has declared martial law in the provinces of Poltava, Tcherhigov and Khar'kov, according to a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd. Freight traffic has been resumed on portions of the railway lines near the Baltic held by the Germans.

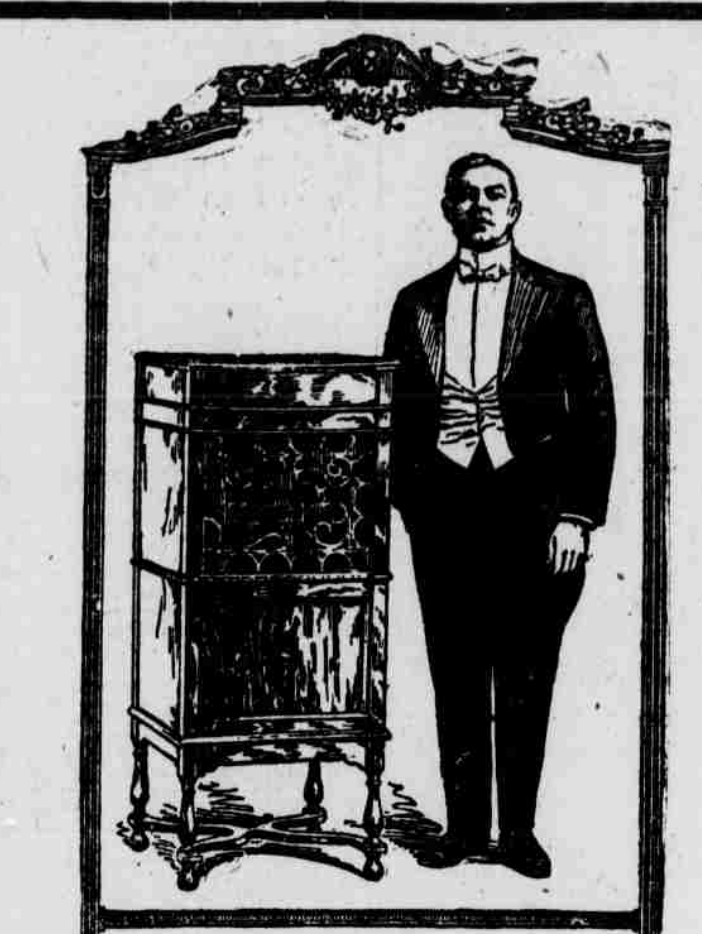
The Russian Orthodox church has presented a demand that the Russo-German peace treaty prescribe its authority over the orthodox population in the territories lost through the peace treaty.

LENROOT AND THOMPSON RUNNING CLOSE RACE

Milwaukee, Wis., March 20.—Outstanding features of yesterday's loyalty primary were a fivefold increase in the socialist vote, the overwhelming victory of Joseph E. Davies for the democratic senatorial nomination and the close race between Irvine L. Lenroot, the loyalist candidate, and James Thompson, who carried the banner of the La Follette republicans in the senatorial race of that party.

AERIAL FIGHTING ON BRITISH LINE SEVERE

London, Tuesday, March 19.—In intense aerial fighting on the British front in France and Belgium twenty-eight German airplanes were accounted for by British aviators, says the official statement on aviation operations tonight. Twelve British machines were reported missing. The statement reads:
