NOTICE TO RETURNED SOLDIERS.

All persons discharged from military or naval forces residing in this county, can now receive medical attention and medical examination for the filing of applications for compensation. The United States Public Health Service, the medical advisors to the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, have established offices in Hancock County, and Dr. E. A. Doty, Kyles Ford, Tennessee, has been appointed as local Government examiner. All persons desiring to obtain insurance or filing application for compensation under the Bureau of War Risk Act, must furnish a medical certificate of their present physical condition. These persons, by applying to Dr. Doty, may be examined and receive certificates of fitness. Dr. Doty's office is located at the Government hospital or institution, should this be necessary. 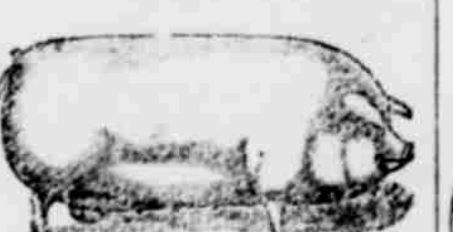

FARM FACTS Worth Remembering

Market prospects for honey are good, according to Ohio bee culturists.

Fayette county, Tenn., farmers have commenced the marketing of hogs by the co-operative plan.

Nebraska estimates that the state will need 200 tractor men during the road building season this year.

Mississippi cattle feeders have organized for the purpose of better feeding and marketing their farm stock.

The third annual fat cattle show to be held at Nashville, December 18 and 19, is offering \$2,500 in cash premiums.

Seven hens in North Dakota laid 100 eggs in December with a feed cost of \$1.35. The eggs sold for 70 cents a dozen.

Tennessee livestock men think that the state has a hog law, that there should be no excuse for every farmer not having a few hogs.
